

Amelia Cross ss.

At a Court of General Quarter sessions of the
Peace held at Evesham in and for said
County on the ninth day of November 1844
before the Honble Judge of the same Court.

The petition of inhabitants of the townships of Clapton
and Dean in said County was presented Representing that they
labor under great inconvenience by reason of the present location
of the Public Road between the termini of Wyke Gap Road and
Brattle Mill. And therefore praying the Court to appoint persons
to view the said road and supply the portion of said road.

The Court upon due consideration of the premises do order and
appoint Henry Scilow, William McCauley and D. R. Stone to view
the road proposed to be vacated and supplied, who after having been
first duly sworn or affirmed according to law to discharge the duties
of their appointments with fidelity, are to go upon the premises where
said road is located. And if all the said Viewers be of the same mind and
a majority of them agree that there is occasion to vacate and supply
said road, they shall proceed to do so as agreeably to the wishes of
the Petitioners as may be having respect to the best good for a road and
the shortest distance and in such manner as to do the least injury
to private property.

The persons interested in said Road being
summed by public citation by posted and written had Bills or
advertisements of the time and place where said Viewers shall meet
for the purpose of vacating and supplying said Road, at least ten days
before such meeting.

If the Viewers aforesaid shall decide upon vacating and
supplying said road, it is hereby made their duty to obtain

from the person through whom land the said road may pass
relieve from any damages that may arise to them in opening
the same. And in every case when the owners of lands
refuse allowing their claim to damages, the said Juries shall
assess the damages, and make report thereof, signed by a majority
of their present, and transmit the same together with all papers
to the Court of Quarter Sessions to be held in said office.

And the said Juries shall make Report of their proceedings
herein to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held in said County
accompanying the same with a Pet. or Draft of said road.
With reference to the improvement that shall be passed, in
which Reports they shall state that they have been sworn or appointed.
And also, whether they judge said road necessary for a Public
or Private Road.

Bean Esquire President Judge and John Hancock and John Thomas Esquires his Associate Judges now Composing a Court of Quarter Sessions and for the Peace in and for the County of Cambria at March Term AD 1878 We the undersigned Jurors do report that we gave due and timely notice of time and place of our meeting by printed hand bills ^{Posted} along the road proposed to be located and supplied ^{at time and place designated by said notices} and after all first being duly sworn according to law we proceeded to the duties of our appointment And did view and locate the following parts of said road in consequence of steep hills in our opinion it being useless inconvenient and burdensome to the public Travel Beginning at a point on Cherry Tree and Hollidaysburg State road near Buckhorn Hotel in Grant Township Cambria County Thence North two perches thence North twenty one and one half degrees East twenty perches thence North fourteen degrees East fourteen perches thence North thirty degrees East twenty four perches thence North twenty six and one half degrees East twenty perches thence North sixteen degrees East twenty perches thence North five degrees East twenty six perches thence North ten degrees East twenty six perches to forks of Mountain road thence beginning N.W. of Bluff hill on said road thence North eighty three degrees West sixty three perches thence North forty degrees West two perches thence North thirteen degrees West twenty eight perches thence North seven degrees East two perches to point in old road near Sandy flat from here we go N.W. of of Wm. McCauleys residence in said road thence North twenty two degrees West twenty perches thence North fifty degrees West twenty eight perches thence North forty five degrees West fourteen perches thence

North sixty two degrees West thirty perches to Point in old road
from here we go to Point on Chestnut hill thence by same old
road North seventy degrees West five perches thence North fifty three

degrees West thirty four perches thence North thirty six degrees

to Point in Old road near residence of Thomas Byrne thence we
go to Point on line of Thomas Byrne and Joseph Byrsts North
of School House thence North three degrees East forty perches

North twenty degrees East thirty six perches thence North
forty six degrees East twenty perches North fifty five degrees
West twenty two perches Point in old road which parts of said
old road in our opinion should be located in consequence
of its several steep hills has become useless in convenience
and burthensome to the inhabitants thereabouts And we
Supply the same as follows for a Public road or high
way Beginning at or near mouth of Public road leading
to Swens Mills thence South twenty five degrees East
thirty two perches in field of Mark Nivelokan thence South
Six and one half degrees East forty perches thence South
twenty four degrees West thirty perches thence South thirty
four degrees West thirty eight perches to Point on line of
Thomas Byrne and Joseph Bryant from here we go
to a Point N E of Joseph Bryants old coal bank on old road thence

two perches to East bank of Clarifield creek thence 4 North eighty

old road N W of Wm McCaully's residence from here we go to Sandy
flat to point at old road thence North fifty four and one half degrees
East thirty perches to point in old road from here we go to fork of
Mountain road thence South thirty seven and one half degrees East twen-
ty four perches South twenty one and a half degrees East forty four
perches South five and one half degrees East thirty perches South
eight degrees East sixty eight perches thence South three de-
grees West twenty two perches to mouth of graded road
And we further assent and award a damage of fifty dollars
to Mark Whirlshaw damages done to him by opening said
road through his improved land
