

Cambria County St.

At a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace
held at Ebensburg in and for said County on the seventh
day of August A.D. 1882 before the Honorable Judges of the
said Court. The petition of the supervisors and sundry
inhabitants of Chest township in the County of Cambria
was presented setting forth: That a road has long since been laid out from
St. Lawrence to Shantz's Mills in Elder township (formerly Chest township)
part of which road beginning at St. Lawrence to a point on the township line
between Elder & Chest townships your petitioners conceive has now become
useless, inconvenient and burdensome and entirely of no use to the
general public and the inhabitants of said township praying the said
Court that the same may be vacated agreeably to the Act of Assembly in
such case made and provided. The Court upon due consideration
had of the premises do order and appoint Henry Seaborn Peter Harker &
John W. Shurlough to view the said road who after having first given
due and legal notice of the time and place of meeting, by printed or
written advertisements and having been duly qualified according to law
to discharge the duties of their appointment with fidelity shall proceed to
view the same and if all the said viewers view the same and a
majority of them agree that said road has become useless incon-
venient and burdensome and of entirely of no use to the general public
or the inhabitants of said township they shall proceed to vacate the
same and make report of their proceedings herein to the next
Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for said County accompa-
nying the same with a plot or draft of said road vacated with ref-
erence to the improvements through which it passed in which
report they shall state distinctly that they had been sworn or af-
firmed.

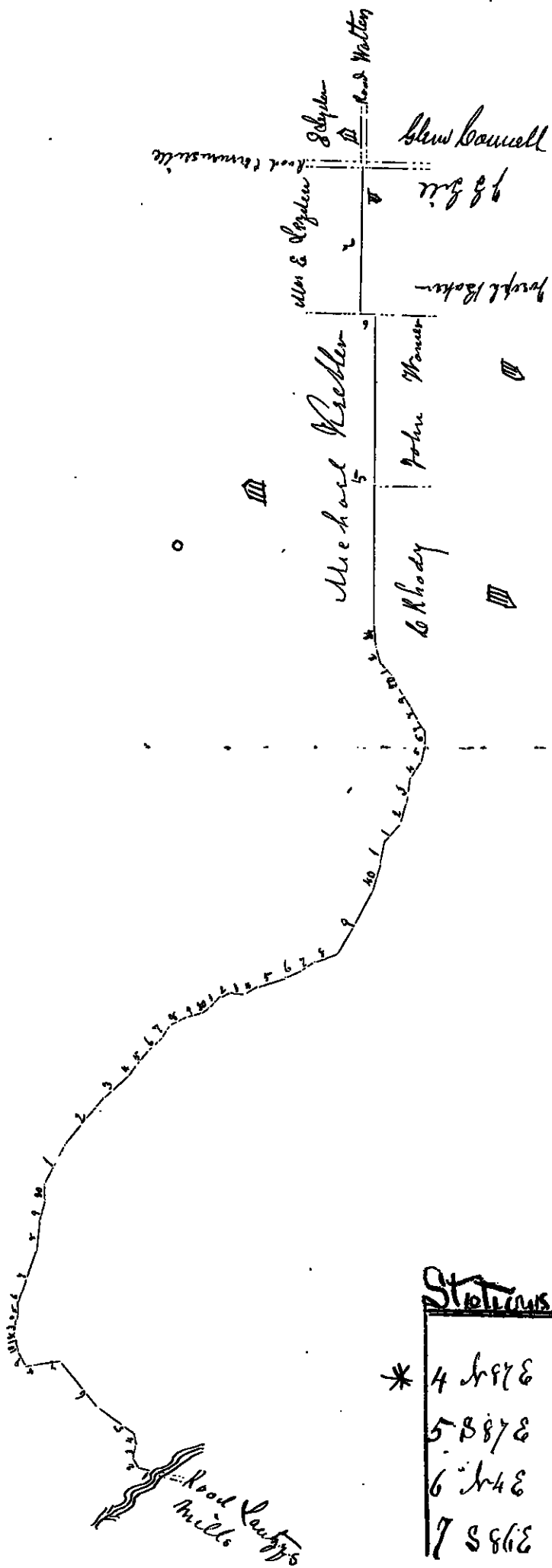

by line of land of Michael Kibbler Charles Rhoady and John Warner South Eighty seven degrees East two hundred and twelve perches 6<sup>th</sup> continuing by line of land of Michael Kibbler and Joseph Baker North four degrees East ten perches 7<sup>th</sup> by line of land of Joseph Baker and Elizabeth Lynden South Eighty six degrees East one hundred perches to Point on road leading from Glen Connell to Curwensville in the village of Glen Connell which said parts of road in our opinion should be vacated as portions of the road have are filled up and has been all summer by log men making timber and said road will require one expensive bridge over Chest Creek and three expensive bridges over Rock Run which said Township is unable now to rebuild and maintain the one over Chest Creek being floated away the three over Rock Run being rotten not safe for travel said road having become inconvenient and burdensome and useless to the Citizens of Chest Township and public travel.
