To the Judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace in the within order named

We the subscribers, the persons appointed by said Court to view and lay out the Road therein named or mentioned. Report that public notice having been given by written advertisements of the time and place when and where they would meet for the purpose of discharging their duty according to law, and that having been first severally sworn or affirmed in the manner and form prescribed by the said order

That all of said viewers to wit St. Miller, Alexander Leover and David J. Horner, met at the time and place, advertised, and having viewed the ground for the propose road, and all of us concerning, and agreeing that the same is necessary for a private Road and private use, did lay out and now return the same for a private Road to wit

Beginning at the Public Road near Christ Dipples thence north fourteen and one fourth degrees East (and six feet from line of Spenger and Dipple, so as to make a Road twelve wide on Spengers side of the line) twelve rods to a post near Solomons run, thence into land of Christ Dipple, north twenty eight degrees East fourteen rods to a post thence north sixteen degrees East fifteen rods to a post thence north thirty five and a half degrees East ten rods thence north nineteen and a half degrees East fourteen rods thence through land of Jacob Jacoby North twenty four degrees East thirteen rods thence north fifteen and three fourth degrees East twenty two rods thence north twenty six East twenty two rods to a post near Sugar, thence north thirty seven and three fourth degrees East eight rods thence north twenty nine and three fourth degrees East eighteen to line of C. J. Co) twenty in all to post thence north fifty one degrees East five rods thence south fifty five degrees East three rods thence through land of Jacob Jacoby south three degrees West nine rods thence south eleven and three fourth degrees East six rods thence south three and a half degrees West eight rods thence south seven degrees West sixteen rods to land of Jacob Le Horner

And said viewers further Report that they Endeavored to obtain Releases from the persons through whose land the said Road passes and that

And they further Report that they have considered and assessed the damages to the persons through which said Road passes and they find and Report that John Spenger has or will sustain damages to the amount of fifteen \$15. Dollars and that Christ Dipple Henry Rice and Jacob Jacoby has or will sustain no damages by the opening of said Road and therefore assess and allow them no damages

It is reference to the land through which said passes a plot or draft is hereto annexed

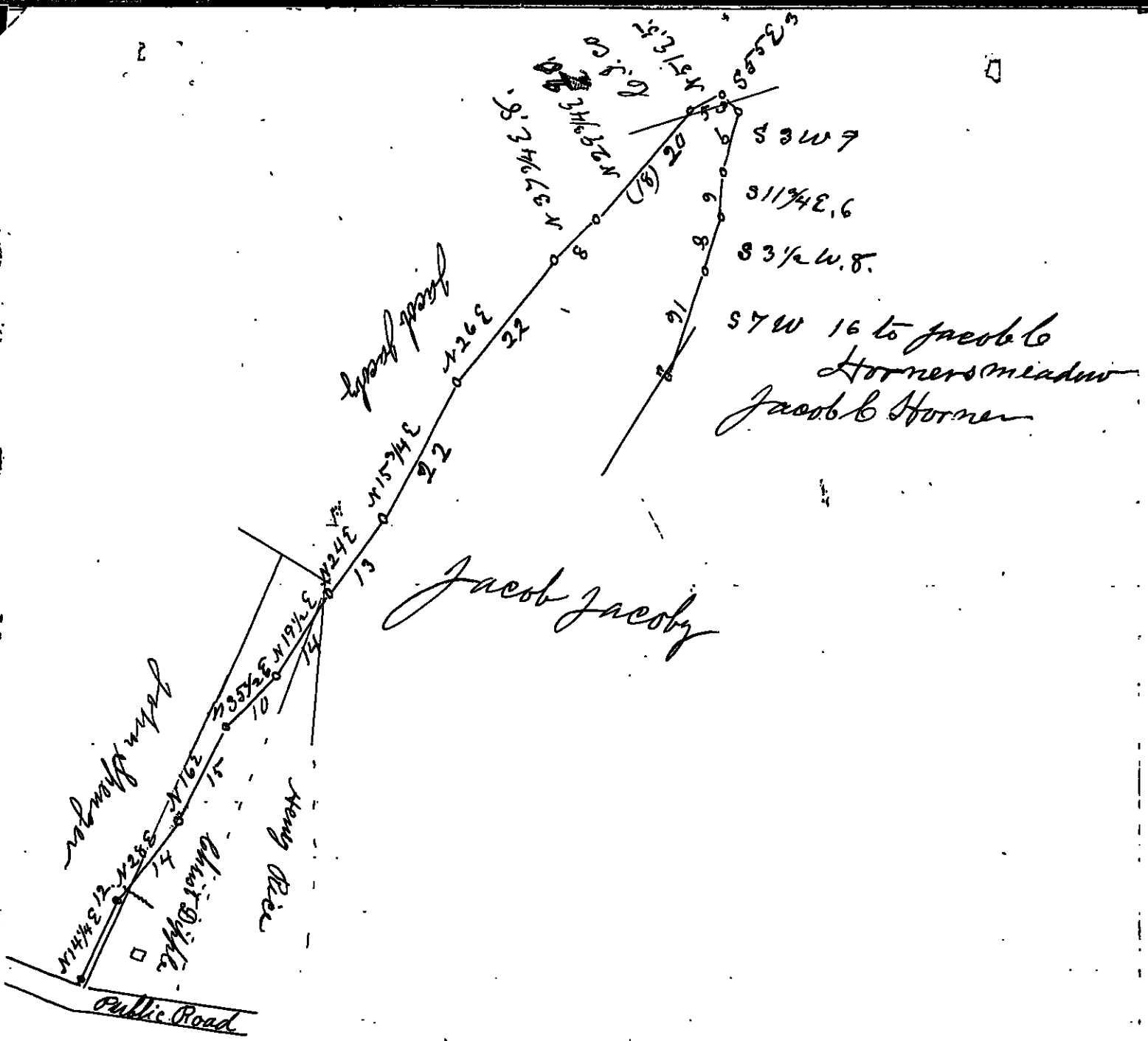

At a court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the County of Cambria
held at Cherryburg in the said County, on the 5th day of
May A. D. 1884, before the Honorable the Judges of the same

court: Upon the petition of Jacob C. Stoner ~~of~~ inhabitants of the township of Stony Creek
in the said county, setting forth that they labor under inconvenience for want of a
private road or highway, to lead from
the public road at or near Christ Dippl's land in
Stony Creek Township on a line north to the run
over Dippl's land about ten rods thence along the
old road South East to the line of land of said
Jacob C. Stoner

and therefore praying the court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the
same according to law. The Court upon due consideration had of the premises, do
order and appoint, J. H. Miller SURVEYOR,
and Alexander Covvans and David J. Stoner

VIEWERS, to view the ground proposed for said
road, and if they view the same, and shall agree that there is occasion for such
road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance
and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to
private property and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the
petitioners, and that they make a report of their proceedings to the next Court
of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, stating particularly whether they
judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft
thereof, and the courses and distances, and references to the improvements through
which it may pass.

NOTE.—“It shall be the duty of all persons appointed in the several counties of this Commonwealth to view and review any public or private road or bridge, if they shall decide in favor of locating said road or bridge, to endeavor to procure from the persons over whose land such location may be made releases from all claims for damages that might arise from the opening of such road or the building of such bridge; and in every case where said viewers shall fail to procure such releases, and it shall appear to them that any damages will be sustained, it shall be their duty to assess the damages and make report thereof signed by a majority of their number, and return the same, together with all releases obtained, to the Court of Quarter Sessions, and the damages so assessed shall be conclusive, or may be subject to appeal, review or modification, as may be provided by existing laws in the different counties of this Commonwealth.”

“The persons appointed as aforesaid shall view such ground, and if they shall agree that there is occasion for a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance, and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the petitioners.”

“The viewers, as aforesaid, shall make report, at the next term of said Court, and in the said report shall state particularly: first, who of them were present at the view; second, whether they were severally sworn or affirmed; third, whether the road desired be necessary for a public or private road; they shall also annex and return to the Court a plot or draft thereof, stating the courses and distances, and noting briefly the improvements, through which it may pass; and whenever practicable, the viewers shall lay out the said roads at an elevation not exceeding five degrees, (except at the crossing of ravines and streams) where, by moderate filling and bridging, the declination of the road may be preserved within that limit.”
