DEPOSITION of witness taken before me this Twenty-sixth day of September, A. D. 1888, at Cobbsation Room in Court House in Ebensburg,

between the hours of 8 o'clock A. M. and 10 o'clock P. M., by virtue of the annexed Rule of Court and notice thereon agreed of counsel in the case attached to this deposition taken on the 25th of Sept. 1887 endorsed, for the examination of witnesses in a certain cause there pending, wherein  
In re road from Michael Sheehan in White Twp to Gerald Adams Mill in Clearfield Twp.

Defendant

Lukie Dunbar being produced, sworn and examined on the part of the Plaintiff excepted, doth depose and say: My name is Lukie Dunbar am years of age; I am one of the supervisors of White Twp. I live about one mile from the proposed road. I have been over the proposed road. I measured the distance from Sheehan when this road connects to the Fort Hill road. The One hundred and thirty-eight rods or miles and it with a pole. The Fort Hill road is near ~~near~~ the proposed road at this. Yours' chair at the point we measured to on the Elm Cornell road. The Fort Hill road and the road past Adams Mill intersect at Sheehan. The general direction of this Fort Hill road is parallel with the proposed road.

The Fort Hill road is north west of the paved road. I suppose its . mil from Shubars to the Phillipsburg road south of the paved road. I suppose its half a mil from Gerald Adams Mill to the Phillipsburg road. Its 2 roads from Mr. Grimes land to the Fort Hill road along the line of Diskart and Abel. Its ~~450~~<sup>450</sup> ft. to the line between Abel & Gantner. A good private road could be made to the Fort Hill road over either of these hills. I suppose it would be less <sup>60</sup> rods shorter for Mr. Grimes children to go to school by the 2 roads course than by the prepared road. I dont know what it would be any expense to make a road over the 2 road course so that the children could go to school. The ~~leaves~~<sup>leaves</sup> of 35- would open it so that it could be traveled by wagons, Tusha, Long Gabriel Diskart & myself live in a Northwesterly direction from the prepared road. The Tuggoona live in a South Easterly direction from it. I dont think that the prepared road would be either a convenience or a necessity to any of these parties named. I believe they all have a nearer road to St. Augustine than the prepared road named here. We have a good road any more than there are some hills. I am sending my second letter as supervisor. I had no experience in opening new roads before I was supervisor. I made an examination - not a very careful one - as to the expense it would be to open this road. The character of the ground is wet, low flat ground.

William McManamy (affidavit)

I live in White Lake (Petition for appointment of review in this case shown witness and he is asked if he signed it) I signed this petition. Mrs. Grimes asked me to sign it. She told me she wanted a road out to the public highway on the line between Michael Sheehan & Jack Sheehans. She said it was for a private road. I would not have signed the petition if I had known it was for a public road. I understood by her conversation that the Sheehans were both agreed to open it out on the line. No one else was present when I signed it  
Cross-examined by Mr. Kittell

I live between three & four miles from the proposed road. I live East from it. Mr. Grimes said nothing about the other end towards Gerald Adams. I did not read the petition. I read some of the names on it.

"Wm. McManamy

John Montgomery (sworn)

I live in Clearfield Twp on land adjoining land of Mr. Grimes. I own the farm I live on. I have lived there about eight years. Mr. Grimes was living there when I went there. I had been about there for about six years before that. Since I have lived there Mr. Grimes' horses always been coming up the bottom to get out to Adams Mill. There has been a kind of a road there that they could come down. When I fenced my ground I left room

enough arksids of the fence for a road for them. It's a shorter way of getting down than the proposed road. I never measured it but I think so. I am sure it would be cheaper to make the road where it is than to make the proposed road. Its four or five years since I made this fence and left her the road arksids. I don't know of any lumber being hauled out from Adam Mill over this road up past Sheehans in sixtis after two years, they never made a harness of using it. It has been open in the winter the last two years the same as before; they could have used it if they had wanted to. Except what Grimes used it, I don't know of its being used at all with last two years. I don't know of any one who would have lumber to haul to Adam Mill over the proposed road. I think that the whole of the proposed road is swampy. This is a swamp above Sheehan & one below and one where it passes through my land. Some places there would be no fall along this road to carry off the water if ditched; some places there would be. There is a place between Sheehan & Grimes that would be hard to drain.

Cards - examined by Mr. Kittell.

I have seen people walk across from Sheehans to Adam Mill going to church. I suppose they have driven through this going to church. I don't know of any

from one end to the other. I don't know whether it is swampy or not. I know ~~xxx~~  
it would be swampy if used. You could  
not make a business of going over it without  
its becoming swampy. To make this road  
fit for travel - in such condition as other  
two roads - would cost \$1000. - Clarkson was  
over this road with me when I made my  
examination. I have been over the ground  
before. I don't know of any one on the White's  
top side of the Glen Connell road who has  
any log or lumber to haul down from Adams  
mill.

Cross-examined by M. S. Stittet Esq.

I have a public road leading back my place.  
The road I live on connects with the Philipburg  
road and the Fort Hill road. The Philipburg  
road drifts bad in the winter time. I don't  
know what the Fort Hill road does. I don't  
think that the prepared road would be bad  
for drifts. Any road can be made less swamby  
by ditching. There was a portion of the road  
between me and Sherman that was low  
wet ground. It was a different kind  
of wet ground. The wet ground on the road  
between me & Sherman had to be ditched cross  
the stream, and the prepared road would  
have to be ditched with the stream and  
there would be no way to carry the water  
off. There all road was first laid out  
& opened it was swampy, by ditching  
it has been made good since. There are

many public road that when first opened  
and are not swampy, and in course of time  
by working out tax and improving become  
better roads. I have opened out public roads,  
since I was Supervisor, I have opened out  
one new road, the other road. I have worked  
on some trails but not entirely opened.  
I only got one order to open a new road.  
The new road I opened was a ridge - dry  
ground. Then I say it would cost \$1000  
to open this road I mean to ditch it and  
make it fit to travel. I don't mean to stone  
it; to make a pit out of it. It could be  
opened so as to be safe for travel at certain  
seasons of the year for less than that. I could  
not say how much less. It's not over 800  
yards from Mr. Grimes house to the Fort Hill  
road. There is a hill between her house and  
the Fort Hill road, but I really don't believe  
a worse hill than we all have to travel in snowy  
times.

Re-examined by Mr. Parker.

Mrs. Grimes raises crops on her hill and  
hulls them down it to her barn. The  
Philipsburg road drifts between Shohola  
and the Fort Hill road. I don't think that  
the road course would drift in the winter  
so the road road would not drift so  
that the children could not go to school,

one in particular during it. The Philipburg road drifts in the winter time sometimes. People have gone across, <sup>above</sup> my place & Grimes. I generally follow sawmilling. I have not been away from home much the last couple of years. I am sometimes. There is no public road through, or adjoining, my place. I have two ways of getting out from my place. One past Gambries & one past Grimes. They are not roads that have been confirmed by the Court. I cross over other peoples ground in getting out to the public road. If my neighbors would agree to let me out I would try and get a road re-stamined by Mr. Dickey. I don't know of any one that opening this road would make it any nearer to go to church than by the present public roads. Except Mrs. Grimes, I don't think I have over a  $\frac{1}{4}$  of a mile to go over any one else's land than my own to reach the public road. To go from my land out past Grimes I would go over about 5 rods of his land.

Witness: H.S. Myers

Luke Durbin recalled -

The amount of my tax duplicate is \$400<sup>00</sup> I don't think this is sufficient taxes in our Township to warrant dredging and keeping up of any more roads. The general condition of the roads in our Township is middling good.

William Dushart (sworn)

I live in White Top. The Fort Hill road is  
on the line between me & Shuckans. From the  
Fort Hill road to the proposed road, 138 rods.  
I was with Durbin when he made his  
measurements. It's about one mile from  
the proposed road to the Philippi road. The  
Fort Hill road follows my line <sup>about 90</sup> ~~44~~ rods.

The bearing of this line is S. 61 $\frac{1}{2}$  W. The Fort  
Hill road intersects the road past Adam Mill  
at Kathkins. The Fort Hill road is a good  
road for the time it's been opened up. From  
Adam's Mill to the Philippi road is less  
than one mile. Sylvester J. Little's game land

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with me on the Land East. Launthi lives on  
the Glen Connell road. My neighbors - Launthi  
et al attend church at St Augustine. They  
go out <sup>to</sup> the Philipaburg road & church. I  
believe the public road we have is <sup>considerably</sup> nearer  
& church than the proposed road - would  
me. There is a considerable hill ~~is a small hill~~ <sup>in going from</sup>  
~~to~~ <sup>to</sup> Philipaburg road to ~~Adams Street~~ <sup>Adams Street</sup>, but it's  
not much steeper than other hills we have.  
Gabriel & Long seldom ever come our way  
to church; and if they do, come to church ~~neither~~  
of these roads. I don't think I saw either  
of them go to church any way but once  
in 7 years since I have been there. They  
have a public road to go to church that is  
at least a mile nearer than the proposed  
road would be. I don't know of any one  
for whom this road would be either a con-  
venience or a necessity - The distance between  
the Fort Hill road and the land of Mr. Grimes  
on the line between Noel & me is 22 rods.  
It would be better ground over which  
to make a road than the one in controversy.  
The distance between the Fort Hill road and  
the land of Mr. Grimes along the line be-  
tween Gannister and Noel is 45 rods.  
It would be good ground on which to  
make a road. The District School is on part  
of what was originally my farm. Its  
~~about 60~~ <sup>about 60</sup> rods from the Fort Hill road.  
It would be nearer for the children of Mr.  
Grimes to go to school ~~than~~ <sup>than</sup> our this 22

and cause which by the proposed road  
I could not say how much. A winter  
that there would be a great deal of snow  
~~the proposed road~~ <sup>it</sup> would be a bitter  
road for children to go back & forth. The  
Glen Connell road drifts from Sheahan  
up past my place. It did the last two  
winters. I was along with both the neighbors  
and re-measured on this proposed road. I  
have been over the ground before it was  
laid out and since. It would be a very  
expensive road for the length of it. I have  
had some experience in opening public roads  
roads I have been supervisor. I don't be-  
lieve that this proposed road could be made  
what would be called a good public road for  
less than \$1000. The difficulty in draining the  
land is, that its too flat. The water stands  
over so much of it. I know where the line  
between Grimes & Sheahan is. The fence alone  
that Mr. Sheahan would have to build would  
be \$106. (Mr. Kittell repeats objection formerly  
made as to damages) if the road were opened.  
lets all ~~soil~~ <sup>soil</sup> cultivated and  
improved land. It would damage Sheahan  
farm aside from his having to build fence.  
The people in my neighborhood have been get-  
ting some sawing done at Adams, Swans &  
Groffs mills. Swans & Groffs mills are  
on the East side of the Glen Connell road. Mr.  
Luster has hauled logs to Adams' mill, so  
have I - some few - and Purgon did too.

It was two years ago I don't know of any logs being taken up the last year. They were hauling other lumber for me on their own farm in building. There is no power now that I know of that would have occasion to haul logs up to Adams Mill. (Draft shown witness and he is asked to say if the draft represents the roads in this section and if he assisted in making it.) It represents the location as near as I can fix it. I did not make the draft or help to make. I saw a part of it drawn and I believe it to be near correct. Mr. Parker took the paper & ruler and made the draft under my direction. (Draft offered in evidence and marked Exhibit A') (Mr. Kittell objects to the offer because it has not been shown that it was made from an actual survey of the ground being merely a sketch made under the direction of the witness from his idea of the location of the roads.) The damages to Mr. Montgomery's land would be much greater than to Stebbins. Montgomery's land is all improved land. He has no wood land. He would have to buy all materials for making fence.

Cross-examined by Mr. Kittell.  
I don't know as the proposed road if opened would be of any advantage to Montgomery considering the expense. Montgomery claims that he can get out without that road

The hill between Mr. Gomis & the road  
cause to Foot Hill road is not as steep  
as some we have now on our public roads. I don't know of Gomis having  
any difficulty in hauling over this hill.  
I don't think that this proposed road  
could be opened fit for travel for less  
than \$1000. I mean to make it as  
good as our public road say the Phillips  
bury road. I don't think it could be made  
as good as ordinary farm roads connecting  
public roads for less; It's too low and  
wet.

William Dibart

James Davis (sworn)

I live on the Glen Connell road nearly  
opposite to Michael Sheehan. The road  
used by Burgess to get on the GlenConnell  
road is about 10 rods above my house.  
I know where Dibart, Long, Luther, Gabriel  
and Burgess live. The proposed road would  
be more convenient for these people  
and for Sheehan & myself than the public  
roads we already have. The proposed road  
would be of no advantage to any of the  
persons named. The reason is because  
it would make a further cause for us  
to go. It has been two years since any one hauled  
any lumber from Adams Mill down  
into our neighborhood. Luther has been  
getting his lumber from Swan Mill and  
the others have been getting their shingles

from Graff mill. Both these mills are  
on an side of the ~~the~~<sup>GlenConnell</sup> ~~prepared~~ road. It  
would not cost any one from an  
side to haul lumber from Adams Mill.  
They could sell their logs and buy lumber  
cheaper. Burgoons go to St. Augustine to Church.  
They go on the GlenConnell & Philips long road.  
It is nearer than by the prepared road.  
The prepared road runs through cultivated  
land of Mr. Sheehan. Its about eight  
rod from Mr. Sheehans house to his barn.  
The prepared road runs between his house  
and barn. I was with the receivers. I  
don't see how this prepared road would be  
any better than our other roads in regard  
to dredging. I have lined this about 8 years.  
I think the damage done by this prepared  
road would be to Mr. Sheehan land would  
be about \$200. The damage to Montgomery  
land would be about the same probably  
a little more. (Mr. Kettell repeats his  
objection to the question on damages.)

Cross-examined by Mr. Kettell.

I have hauled lumber over through  
Sheehans. We used it in the winter time  
we used it because we sand some hills.  
It was no advantage on account of drifts.  
I am a son-in-law of Sheehans.

Re-examined by Mr. Barker.

I hauled about 5 or 6 thousand feet this  
way through Sheehans. The rest I hauled  
the road. I used it to build a house.

No lumber was ever hauled from Adams  
mill to our side for market.

Witness - H. H. Myers, James Davis & mark

Christian Karlheim (sworn)

I am one of the supervisors of Charfield Twp.  
It takes all the taxes we have in our Twp.  
to keep the present road in repair & more  
besides. This road is granted would be in  
my district. I would have no money or  
taxes ~~& expenses~~ lab. I could apply to the open-  
ing of this road of granted. I have been over  
the proposed road. It would take about  
\$1000 to open this road and make it  
passable. Gabriel & Long go to St. Augustine  
to church. They go past my place to church.  
The present road is nearer for them to  
go to church than the proposed road would  
be. It about a mile nearer past my



and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to  
private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the  
petitioners, and that they make a report of their proceedings to the next Court  
of Quarter Sessions to be held for said county, stating particularly whether they  
judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft  
thereof, and the courses and distances, and references to the improvements through  
which it may pass.

NOTE.—“It shall be the duty of all persons appointed in the several counties of this Commonwealth to view and review any public or private road or bridge, if they shall decide in favor of locating said road or bridge, to endeavor to procure from the persons over whose land such location may be made releases from all claims for damages that might arise from the opening of such road or the building of such bridge; and in every case where said viewers shall fail to procure such releases, and it shall appear to them that any damages will be sustained, it shall be their duty to assess the damages and make report thereof signed by a majority of their number, and return the same, together with all releases obtained, to the Court of Quarter Sessions, and the damages so assessed shall be conclusive, or may be subject to appeal, review or modification, as may be provided by existing laws in the different counties of this Commonwealth.”

“The persons appointed aforesaid shall view such ground, and if they shall agree that there is occasion for a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance, and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the petitioners.”

“The viewers, as aforesaid, shall make report, at the next term of said Court, and in the said report shall state particularly: first, who of them were present at the view; second, whether they were severally sworn or affirmed; third, whether the road desired be necessary for a public or private road; they shall also annex and return to the Court a plot or draft thereof, stating the courses and distances, and noting briefly the improvements, through which it may pass; and whenever practicable, the viewers shall lay out the said roads at an elevation not exceeding five degrees, (except at the crossing of ravines and streams) where, by moderate filling and bridging, the declination of the road may be preserved within that limit.”

it is over swampy ground for a long dis-  
tance.

4<sup>th</sup>. The opening of said road would work a

Skeehan that could not be compensated in  
damages.

5<sup>th</sup>. Many of the undersigned signed the petition

Defendant

James P. McCaus being produced, sworn and examined on the part of the Petitioners for view, doth depose and say:

My name is James P. McCaus, years of age. I am acquainted with the road in controversy. I was a chain carrier on the first view. Part of the ground over which the road passes is swampy and part marshy. I think a little over half of it is marshy. I think the view was made in May. This proposed road does not pass over any other road, it just runs from one road to another and is entirely a new road. Part of the marshy land over which the road passes belongs to Grimes and part between Montgomery and Beason. It took him horses through the proposed road. The Grimes' & the children below go to the district School, the Montgomery children go to the

Cooper School in Clempford Twp. These children have no public road to go to school. They go through the fields. If the proposed road were open I think it would be a convenience to these children to go to school. It would be an outlet for them. The people from the White Oak end of the road; that is the Dushicks, Sheehans and others, would have to go about two & a half miles by public road to get to Adam's Mill. The distance for them if the proposed road was open to Adam's Mill would be about a mile that is from Sheehans. Chest Springs would be the nearest mill, other than Adam's. It would be about six miles from Dusharts Sheehans et al to go to Chest Springs. The proposed road would be a convenience to the people of the neighborhood in going to church in the winter. I have known them to use it. It does not drift. The present road to St. Augustine drifts a great deal, Part of it don't drift a great deal of it they have to go through fields to get through. I don't think that the proposed road will be a drifty road. It may drift but from the appearance of the ground I would not like it to be a drifty road. Just below where the road has been made is frequently used now in the winter. I think that if the road was opened it would be traveled. I could not say whether it would be necessary. The proposed road would be convenient for public travel in going

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to Adams Mill, that is for the people by  
law, I could not say what it would  
cost to open this road, but I would not  
think it would be expensive. It would  
have to be detached. It is principally open  
ground. I reside in Georgetown Town.  
Leaves - examined by A. Barker Esq.  
I live now at St. Augustine. From St.  
Augustine to Adams Mill would be about  
two miles. It was a dry day when ~~when~~  
I was over the proposed road. There might  
have been marshy ground there that I did  
not see. There is marshy ground near any  
place after a wet spell, and it might be there  
after a rain. There is a considerable portion of  
the marshy ground of Mr. Grimes' that lies  
between his house and Sheehan's land. Adams  
Mill is a saw & shingle mill - not a grist mill.  
I know a great many places in our Town  
where children have no public road to go to  
school. I would not say whether it would  
be necessary to build a road as long as  
this just for children to go to school over a  
rot. It would depend on whether they could  
get out without it. For my part I would  
want a road and then I could use it as  
near as I had a mind to. Montgomery has  
no children now to send ~~to school~~ to school.  
Lisharts, Sheehans, Lathers and others living  
near who had lumber to take to that mill  
would find the proposed road convenient.  
I base my opinion of its being convenient

for these people on their using it to take lumber to and from Adams Mill. It has been a couple of years since I have passed through near where this prepared road is to Adams Mill. The present road drifts along by Mr. Wilts, and long down by Sheehans and there is more out around, then you have to turn out at Taylor. Sheehan & Wilts are on the road before you come to the Philipsburg road. The road from Adams Mill to the Philipsburg road at Taylor drifts. If the new road was fenced and opened it might drift, but most of our bottom road do not. You can't tell how it would be until its fenced. I don't think that the new road where it passes along by Grimes & Sheehans on the hill would drift, because it runs west. The principal use they made of this road through the prepared road whenever in winter time was to haul to Adams Mill. I have known them to haul coal over it. The road I have traveled was down below the prepared road along the river, sometimes it would come out on Mr. Sheehans fields where the prepared road is instant, and sometimes comes out about Wilts. Its about a mile from Adams Mill to Taylor on the Philipsburg road. It may be more. I made no measurements to see how far it would be from Sheehans road to Adams Mill. When I say it would be 3 or 4 miles for distants to go to

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Adam's Mill I am carrying on there  
going round by Wilks. I have known  
the road out part Steinhorn & Wilks for I  
suppose 20 years. Then I say that the pro-  
posed road would be convenient for the  
people in going to church I mean for them  
to go up the bottom to Adam Mill and  
then up to Carls Mill to near St. Augustine.  
It's not a public road. Part of it probably  
a half a mile is. John Graydon has cleared  
the bottom and put a fence across it, but  
they open it and use it in winter, they did  
last winter. The proposed public road does  
not run through Graydons farm.

### Thomas Wilks (sworn)

I reside in Clempels top. I live one half mile  
from the proposed road. I am acquainted with  
the land over which the proposed road passes.  
The route of the road is as suitable as any  
ground they can get there as far as I know.  
To make the proposed road as good as ordinary  
public roads would cost about £500. I could  
not tell any thing about its drafting. It was  
hammed up with timber and I don't know  
what it would do if open. It never has  
knifed. There is at present now neither a  
public or private road through the farms  
of Grimes or Montgomery. Mr. Grimes asked  
me permission to go through my land to  
get out to mill and other places and I

gave it to them, or they wanted him had  
to stay there. Frank Grimes widow and three  
children are living on the Grimes estate.  
Montgomery goes out through Adams &  
Adams land as near as I can guess.  
I don't know of any particular travel across  
these farms from Sheehans to Adams Mill  
except on foot. There is no way for vehicles  
to go. There has been no travel there by vehicle  
except in winter time. The travel I speak of in  
the winter time was hauling saw logs straight  
balk & lumber. They hauled this may be  
because it was the most convenient way to get  
to the mill.

Cross - examined by Mr. Barker.  
Lashers - (Tylor's) & Dugouon of St. Louis &  
Jack Sheehan hauled lumber through there.  
I don't remember any other Lashers particular.  
It probably 20-30 years ago since these people  
hauled through there. Since then they have  
got some sawing done at Stevens and other  
mills on the other side. I do not know of any  
one who will have much lumber to haul to  
Adams mill from that side in the future.  
Mr. Grimes is going <sup>over that with us</sup> through my lands com-  
out on the Philadelphia road at Davies'. I think  
there are other people's land over which  
he could go to reach the Philadelphia road.  
At least she has to now; get somewhere.  
Montgomery has a road to go out to the public  
road but it is not a public road. Mr. Grimes  
has lived on this place 6 or 7 years. These people

who hauled log through there before cauled  
have hauled since if they had wanted  
to - that is in the winter time.

Thomas Wills

John & Douglass (sworn)  
I live in Telegraph's Park. I am some acquainted  
with the ground over which this road passes.  
I seen a part of it within this a few days.  
I am acquainted with the farms and neighbor-  
hood there. Like most of our road the pro-  
posed road is swampy and wet at the  
spring - perhaps a little more so. To a certain  
extent I think it would be convenient for  
the homeling public. The folks from the  
law there would use it I suppose. I believe  
I could open the road and make it so it  
could be hauled for £400. I am not a  
road builder and made no estimate. It is  
impossible to say just what it would cost.  
Cross - examined by Mr. Parker  
I live not over three miles from one end  
of the proposed road. I drove in through  
Mr. Wills place to Mrs. Grimes and from  
there I could see up to Adams  
Mills and across to Mr. Sheehans. I could  
see nearly the whole road. Mrs. Grimes pointed  
out the road as laid out by the miners.  
I did not travel over the exact ground on  
which the road is laid out I suppose I  
crossed it. I did not walk across the  
marshy ground between Sheehans and

Mrs. Grimes. I merely went to the fence and looked across. I could not see that portion of the road that is on the line between Nassau and Montgomery from Mrs. Grimes. I could not see the ground clear through to the Nassau line but I could not tell or guess what particular part of the road was laid out. I suppose Durkin, Long, Gabriel, Luther & Deshaw & the other Burgesses, Mr. Sherman Mallonis and others would use this road. Long and Durkin would it in going to our church. I see them frequently there. There is a Trap road from Long's to St. Augustine but I am not able to say whether it would be nearer or not. Gabriel lives not far from this road. I have never been down at his house. I have not had occasion to be in the neighborhood of Long's for some two years. I can not say whether the road in hunting would be nearer for them or not. The other road to St. Augustine would be better. St. Augustine is between my place and this prepared road.

J. H. Douglass

Lake Park (sworn)

I live in Cleopatra's Trap -  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile from St. Augustine. I am pretty familiar with the ground over which this prepared road runs. The road bed of this road is contoured <sup>down</sup> to the burnt dam near the furthest point of the road from the burnt dam seem by

the first road would be 20 or 30 yards.  
The country between the two points - Gerald  
Adams Mill and Sheehans road - is al-  
most flat, except a portion of the Grimes  
and a portion of Montgomery's and the  
latter end at Michael Sheehans. There  
is a portion of it wet, and there is a small  
portion - about 20 rods - that is swampy.  
To open this road as other roads have been  
opened in Clerfield Town would cost  
about £200=. I am one of the Executors of  
the Grimes Estate. There is no road now  
leading from the Grimes property to any  
public road. There was one but it has been  
washed away - gone down the creek. It  
was a private road that Mr. Montgomery  
fenced out for the use of Grimes' before Mr.  
Grimes died. There had been a road us-  
ing winter time from above Sheehans when  
this proposed road starts through Michael  
Sheehans fields for about 60 rods, then  
through the pasture fields of Thos Wilts,  
then through lands of Mark Couplas almost  
to Adams Mill. There is no road there  
now. It has been washed - that is a  
portion of it - to within a few feet of  
the fence some few feet deep. It was  
not a public road. It was not a  
private road. My first knowledge  
of its being used as a road was the  
Spring of 1867, and to the best of my  
knowledge it has been used ever

Sure in the winter time at all any other  
time when they could get through. When  
the farmers would let them use it.  
This road I speak of in 1867 passed through  
a portion of Montgomery's land. There were  
gates up on the road. Montgomery's closed  
the gates. Then there was a portion of the  
time I can't tell how long did get out.  
Then Montgomery fixed a kind of a road  
for them along the bank of the creek.  
They used it until the water washed it  
away and then now they pass in and  
out through Mr. Wilk's pasture field.  
Montgomery's in getting out horses over  
a piece of woodland belonging to John  
Sagle, then through woodland of the heavier  
estate to the road above Gerald Adams' Mill.  
This proposed road would furnish back  
these families with an outlet to the pub-  
lic roads. I don't think a <sup>better</sup> road could  
be laid out between the points of the  
proposed road than the ~~proposed~~ one laid  
out. I regard this proposed road as neces-  
sary for the convenience of the traveling pub-  
lic. I think its four miles to the nearest  
coal bank by public's road from these  
farms. So far as I am able to state if this  
proposed road were opened it would give  
these people an outlet for coal under the  
Grimes farm.

Cross-examined by the Parker  
I prepared the definition for Mr. Grimes in

the case. I did not circulate the petition  
she set I believe. It is about a mile and  
3/4 from the upper end of this proposed road.  
The 20 rods of swamp I speak of on the road  
is on the Grimes estate between Sheehans &  
Grimes - I mean by opening it as some  
of the roads in the Park to open it as much  
of the side-roads are opened other than  
the main roads. I have never been  
upwards. I have not had much ex-  
perience in opening public roads or build-  
ing them. I was not along with either  
view, but I know the ground. I chiefly from  
my previous knowledge of the ground I  
have not made any particular examination  
of it. There is one place on Mr. Grimes road  
that has been washed away about three  
or four rods, the other place is somewhat  
shoaler, there is no road left. It could  
have been fixed with cribbing so that it  
could not have washed away but there  
was no stone in the country. I have  
seen people use the road from Sheehans  
down to Adams Mill at other times than  
winter. I saw a team go over the road  
in the Spring of 1855 or 6. There is no coal  
bank open on the Grimes property. James  
Mellors bank is the nearest coal bank  
for these people that I know of. If that  
Grimes had a private road out between  
Gammons & Nails it would be nearer to  
the bank than the proposed road but

would be very difficult to travel. This proposed road runs between Mr. Sherburne's house and barn. I can't say whether it would be less injury to Sherburne to have the road go above his barn or not. I might say that above the barn would interfere with his apple trees. The only part of the proposed road that lays on the bed of the private road of Mr. Sherburne Grimes spoken of is last course shown on the draft attached to run about 22 rods.

Re-examination by Mr. Kittell.

I would say that the mean distance between this old road and the proposed road is about 160 yards. It might be more and probably less in some places. I don't think that there would be any probability of this proposed road drifting.

Re-cross examined by Mr. Paskins  
I never saw any drifts along those streams. Possibly if opened and fenced it might have an effect on its drifting but I don't think it would ever drift sheet with snow. I don't know of any road in that country that runs along a stream where the land is cleared. From the proposed road to the south east line of the Grimes land is about  $\frac{160 \text{ or } 17}{44}$  rods. This private road was still further south East of the Grimes line about 30 or 40 rods. The Grimes private road runs about 88 rods in the same course as the 22 rods course I have mentioned.



If they shall decide in favor of locating said road or bridge, to endeavor to procure from the persons over whose land such location may be made releases from all claims for damages that might arise from the opening of such road or the building of such bridge; and in every case where said viewers shall fail to procure such releases, and it shall appear to them that any damages will be sustained, it shall be their duty to assess the damages and make report thereof signed by a majority of their number, and return the same, together with all releases obtained, to the Court of Quarter Sessions, and the damages so assessed shall be conclusive, or may be subject to appeal, review or modification, as may be provided by existing laws in the different counties of this Commonwealth.”

“The persons appointed as aforesaid shall view such ground, and if they shall agree that there is occasion for a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance, and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the petitioners.”

“The viewers, as aforesaid, shall make report, at the next term of said Court, and in the said report shall state particularly: first, who of them were present at the view; second, whether they were severally sworn or affirmed; third, whether the road desired be necessary for a public or private road; they shall also annex and return to the Court a plot or draft thereof, stating the courses and distances, and noting briefly the improvements, through which it may pass; and whenever practicable, the viewers shall lay out the said roads at an elevation not exceeding five degrees, (except at the crossing of ravines and streams) where, by moderate filling and bridging, the declination of the road may be preserved within that limit.”
