The Court upon due consideration do order and appoint George Murray, William Palmer, Hugh Sugan, Henry Michael, John Pringle & James Burk to review the said road and parts adjacent, and if any five of them review the same, and any four of the actual reviewers agree that there is occasion for such a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same as agreeable to the desire of the petitioners as may be, having respect to the best grounds for a road and the shortest distance, and in such a manner as to do the least injury to private property, and that they make report of their proceedings to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said County, stating particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft thereof and the courses and distances, and references to the improvements through which it may pass.

At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace  
held at Cheesburg in and for said County,  
on the Fifth day of July A. D. 1855, before  
the Honourable the Judges of the same  
Court:—

Upon the petition of divers inhabitants of the township of  
Jackson in the said County, setting forth, that they labor  
under great inconveniences for want of a private road to  
lead from Timothy Hunt's farm on the township road  
that leads from Peter Kinney's to the Jefferson road to intersect  
the township road at or near W. W. Harris, and therefore  
praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and  
lay out the same according to law. The Court upon due  
consideration had of the premises do order and appoint  
Jacob Seveigood, Ephraim Burkhart, David Seidy, Paul  
Cobough, Philip Rager and John S. Horner to view  
the grounds proposed for the said road, and if they or  
any five of them view the same and any four of the  
actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such a  
road, they shall proceed to lay out the same as agreeable  
to the desire of the petitioners as maybe, having respect  
to the best grounds for a road and the shortest distance,  
and in such a manner as to do the least injury to  
private property, and that they make report of their  
proceedings to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be  
held for the said County, stating particularly whether  
they judge the same necessary for a public or private  
road, together with a plot or draft thereof and the  
courses and distances, and references to the improve-  
ments through which it may pass.

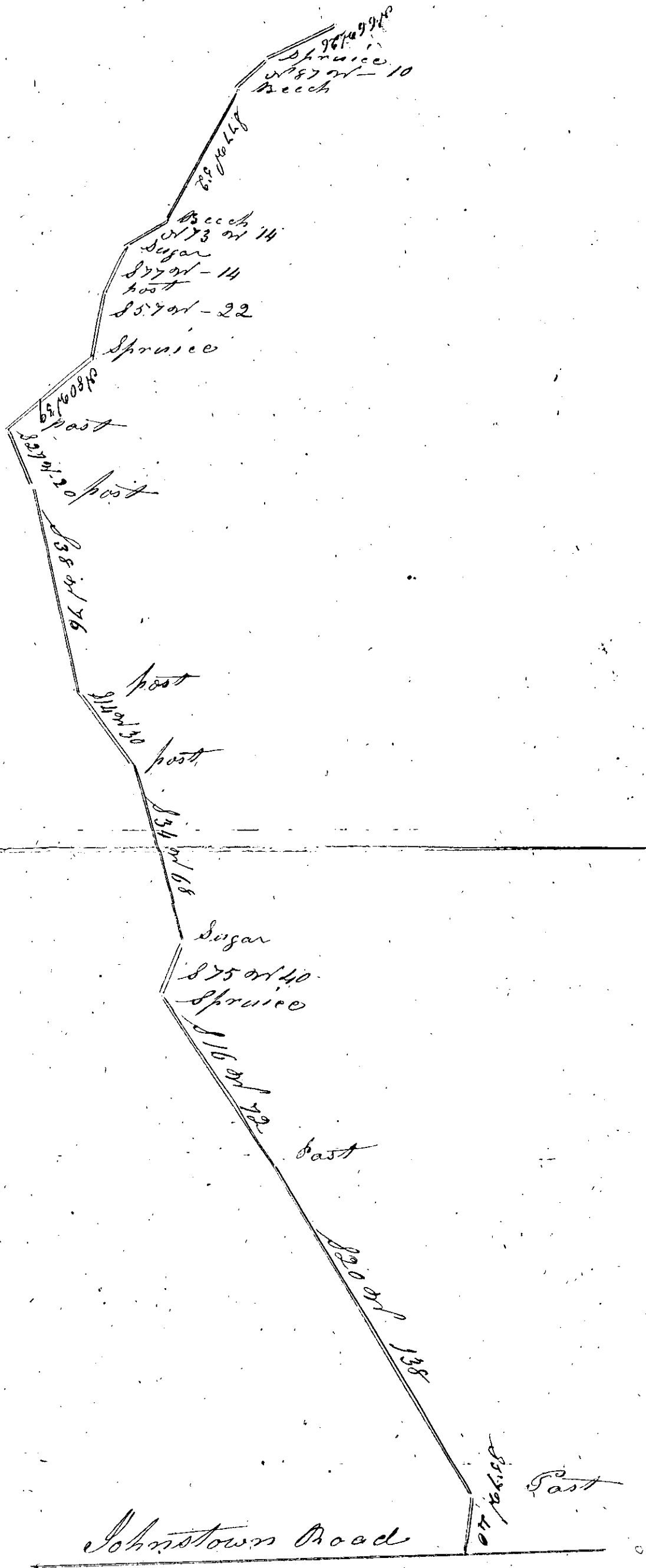
