At a Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace held at Ebensburg in and for said County, on the Eleventh day of October, A. D. 1857, before the Honorable the Judges of the said Court: -

Upon the petition of divers inhabitants of the Townships of Cambria and Blacklick, in the said County, setting forth that they labor under great inconveniences for want of a road or highway to lead from a point on the Pennsylvania, Cambria & Indiana Turnpike, near the cabin formerly occupied by John Gardner (now vacant) in Cambria Township, thence by the nearest and best route until it intersects the public road leading from the house of John Gillam to the Bethel Meeting house on the Clay Pike, at or near the farm of William Owens, in Blacklick Township; and therefore praying the Court to appoint proper persons to view and lay out the same according to law. The Court upon due consideration had of the premises do order and appoint Samuel S. Price, William Wherry, David Bowley, John Gillam, John Williams & Ezekiel Hughes to view the grounds proposed for the said road, and if they or any five of them view the same and any four of the actual viewers agree that there is occasion for such a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same as agreeable to the desire of the petitioners as may be, having respect to the best grounds for a road and the shortest distance, and in such a manner as to do the least injury to private property, and that they make report of their proceedings to the next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the said County, stating particularly whether they judge the same necessary for a public or private road, together with a plot or draft thereof and the courses and distances, and references to the improvements through which it may pass.
