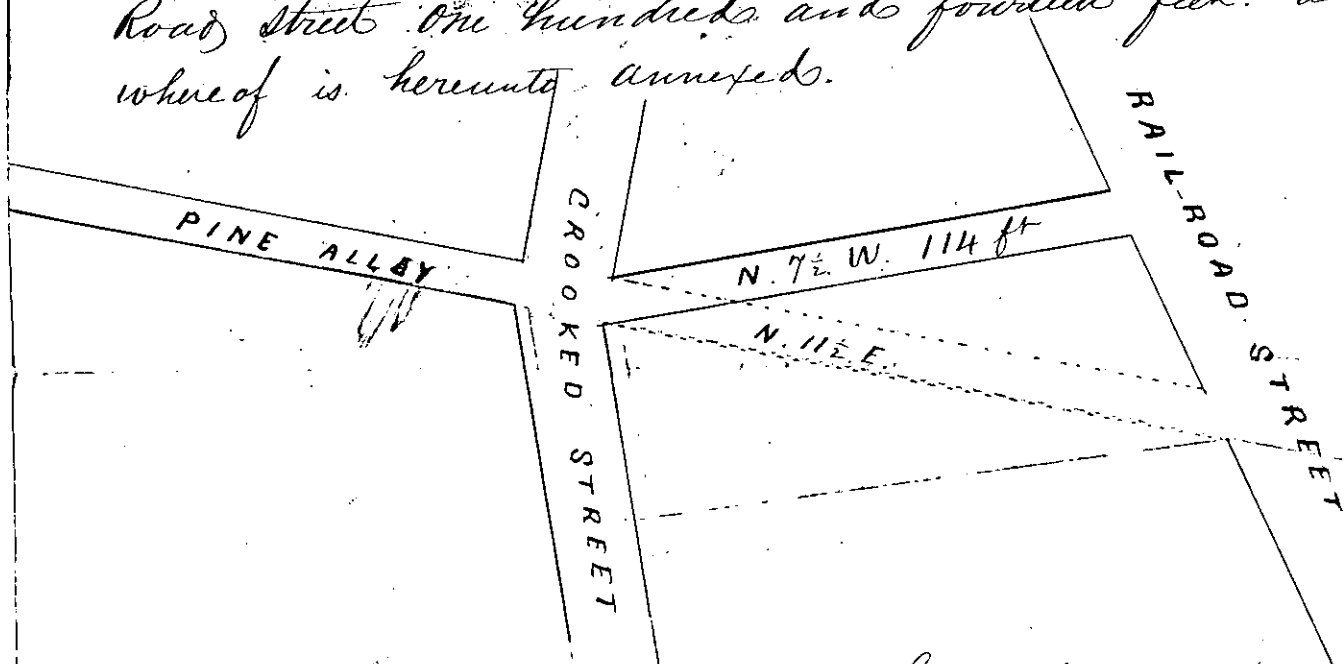

as at present located, will do great injury to private
property, and that its location should be changed;
and that there is occasion for such an alley, they
shall proceed to lay out the same, as agreeable to
the desire of the petitioners as may be, having
respect to the best location, and in such manner
as to do the least injury to private property, and
that they make report of their proceedings to the
next Court of Quarter Sessions to be held for the
said County, together with a plot thereof & the
courses and distances, and reference to the im-
provements through which it may pass.

would cost more than One thousand dollars—
And the few persons who would at all be

the Plank road as located from Ebeusburg
to Carrolltown, by a road already opened
at a distance of six hundred yards—

The undersigned further represent that the
public road leading from Ebeusburg to Carroll-
town can be reached from Snyder's mill
by a road over good ground at a distance
of about three ~~quarters~~ of a mile, and as they
have before stated there is a road already
opened from the said mill to the location
of the Plank Road at ~~about 200~~ 200
yards— Snyder and a few others who
reside near where the mill is situate

are the only persons who would be accommodated
by the confirmation of the road complained of,

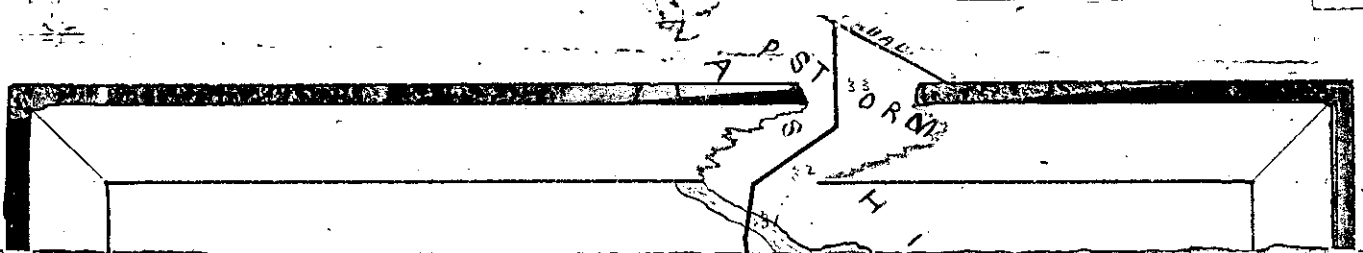

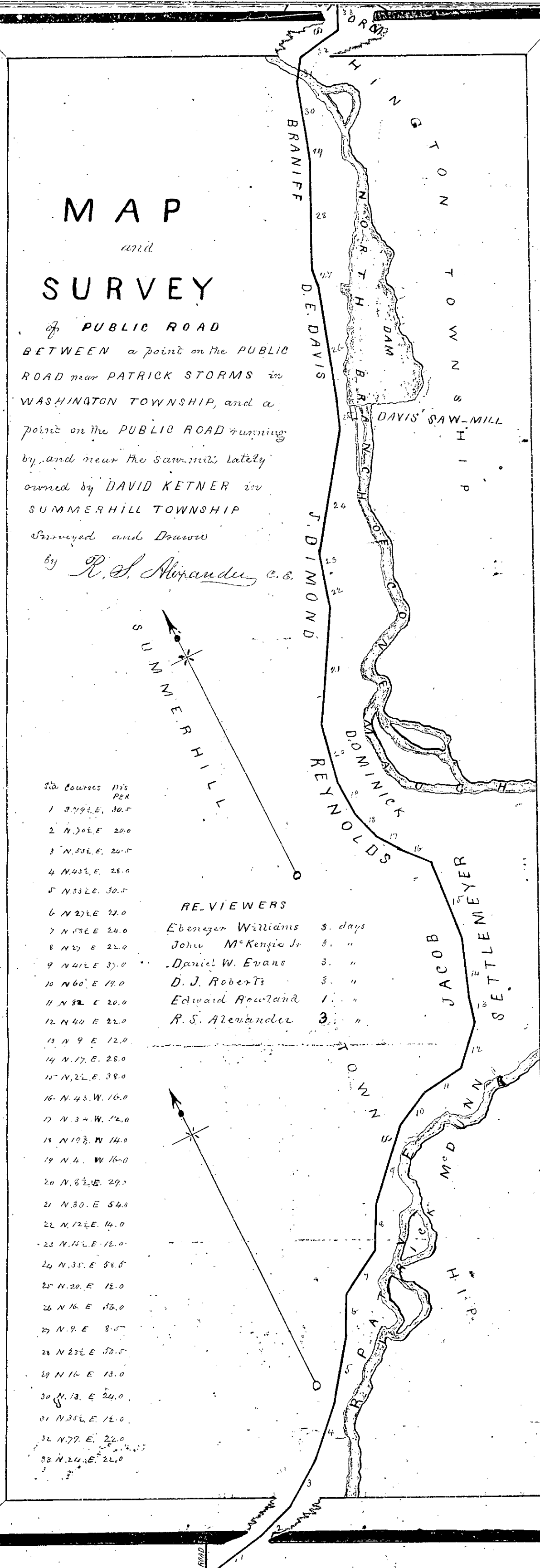

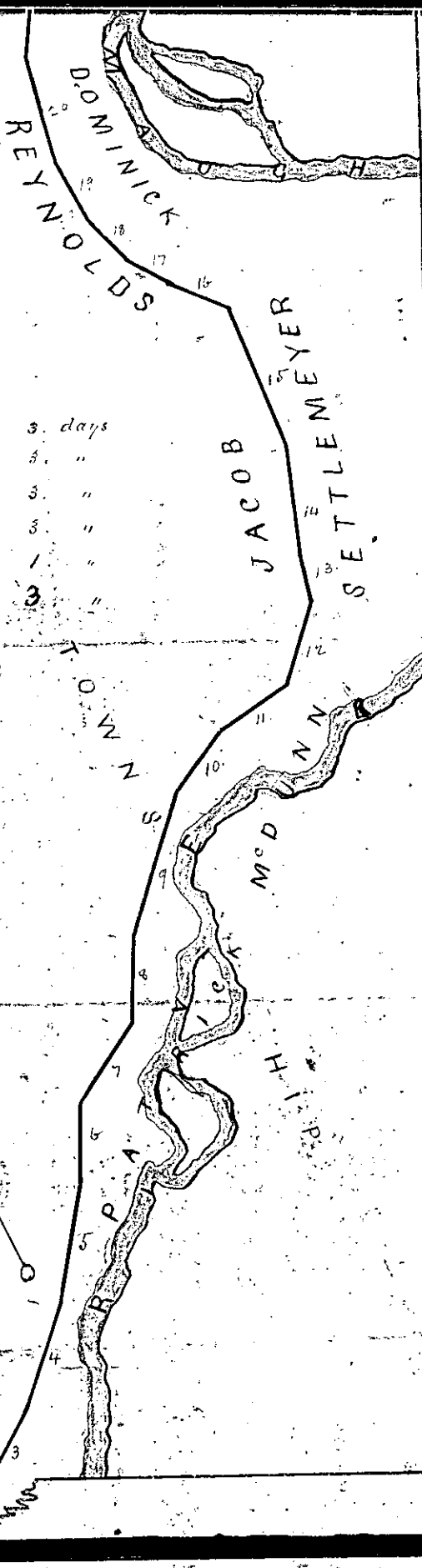
