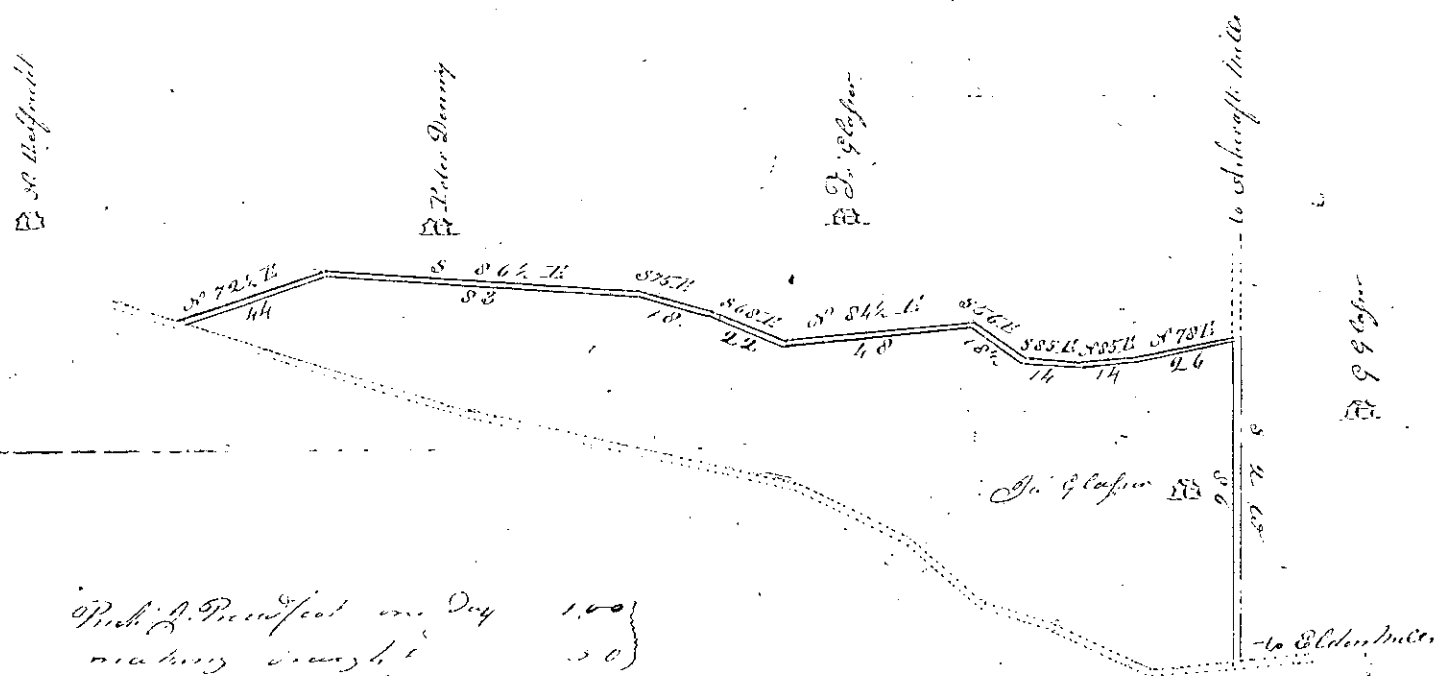

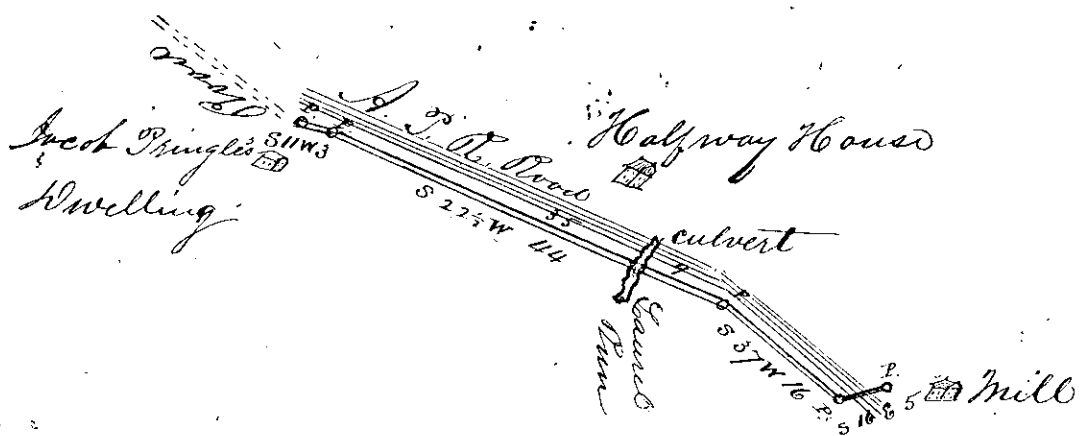

and in places is entirely washed away
by the action of the River and does
not seem to be at all required as a
Thoroughfare

Somerset Street is in that part
of Johnston Borough known as
Kerrville commencing at the Southern
end of the Bridge over Stoney Creek
following the Bank of the River for a
distance of two squares and then -

Removing Straight Straightening a bend

on curve in the river. The proprietor
of this part of Johnston Borough has
laid out this Street Forty feet wide
and the Viewers are of the opinion that
it is of ample width for all necessary
purposes for a street of its length and
similarly situated.

The undersigned beg leave respectfully to
represent to your honors, that on the 11 day of
October 1857. upon the petition of divers Citizens of
of Sumner Hill Township, and upon the report of
David S. Jones, Res. Roberts, Evan Lloyd, Eliehael
Brantiff, James Willman, and Thomas M. Connell.
the persons appointed by your honors at the January
Sessions then past, for the purpose of laying out
"a public road in Washington (now Munster Township)
"from the land of Patrick Storm, to the public road
"leading from Jefferson to Evansburg, on the land of
David Ketner in Sumner Hill Township." That
thereupon your honors did confirm and approve
the report aforesaid, and ordered that the road
According to the metes and bounds returned should
be opened for public use. and directed that it should
be entered of Record, and opened and cleared to
the breadth of thirty feet &c. which said order to
open was placed in the hands of John Pringle the
then Supervisor of Sumner Hill Township. That some
time after the order to open was placed in the
hands of the Supervisor, a petition was presented
to your honorable Court for an order to Review
the ground. That your honors appointed review
who located the road upon nearly the same
ground upon which the first Reviewer had fixed it.
That at the same Court at which the order to review
was returnable, and after it was filed in Court,
a remonstrance against the report of the review
was presented to the Court. (About two thirds of
the Road as first ordered to be opened, was opened
by the Supervisor, to whom the order was given,
leaving only a small portion to open yet.)
That at the June Court, last past, upon the
petition of only a few persons, (none but Dimonds
and Davis,) who had been amongst the first
to petition for the road! This honorable Court granted
an order to vacate said road. The report
of the Reviewer favorable to the vacating of the
Road is on file, and was, on 15 Sept. last
Confirmed Novo by your honors.

Now, your petitioners humbly represent, that, if the
 order to vacate the said road be made absolute,
 that great injustice will be done them; that many
 of them will be left without any public Avenue
 to reach the Rail Road, or to the County Seat, and
 that they will be left altogether to the mercy of
 neighbors, whose lands intervene between petitioners
 and a public Road, and who have not manifested
 towards petitioners hitherto a neighborly or an amicable
 feeling. In view of these Considerations, and in
 perfect Confidence that your Honorable Court will
 protect us in our just rights; from the Circumstances
 of two sets of Viewers agreeing upon the necessity and
 usefulness of the road being established as it ^{way} just located
 we trust your Honors, may accept the report of the
 Viewers who alledge said road should be vacated.

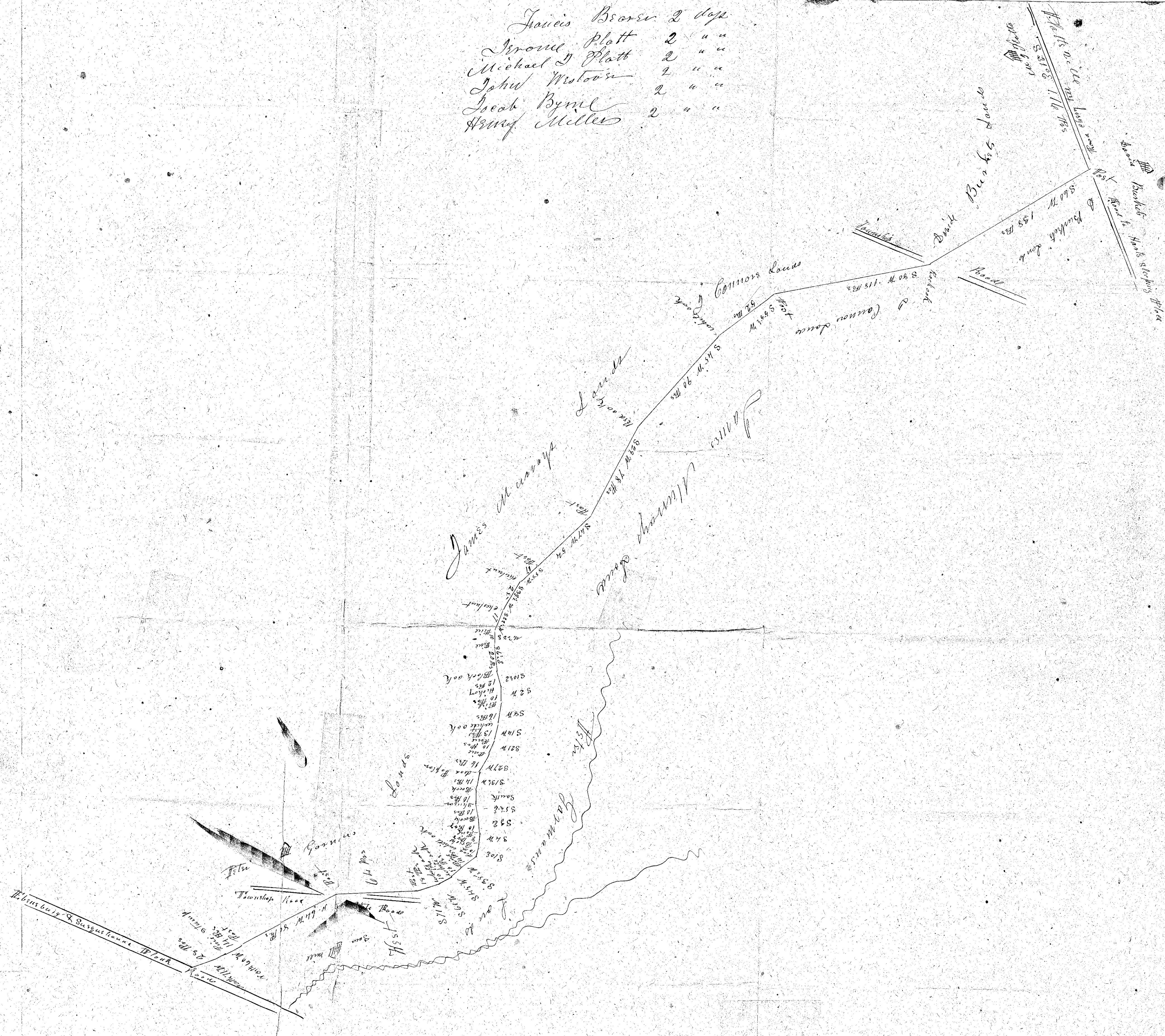
