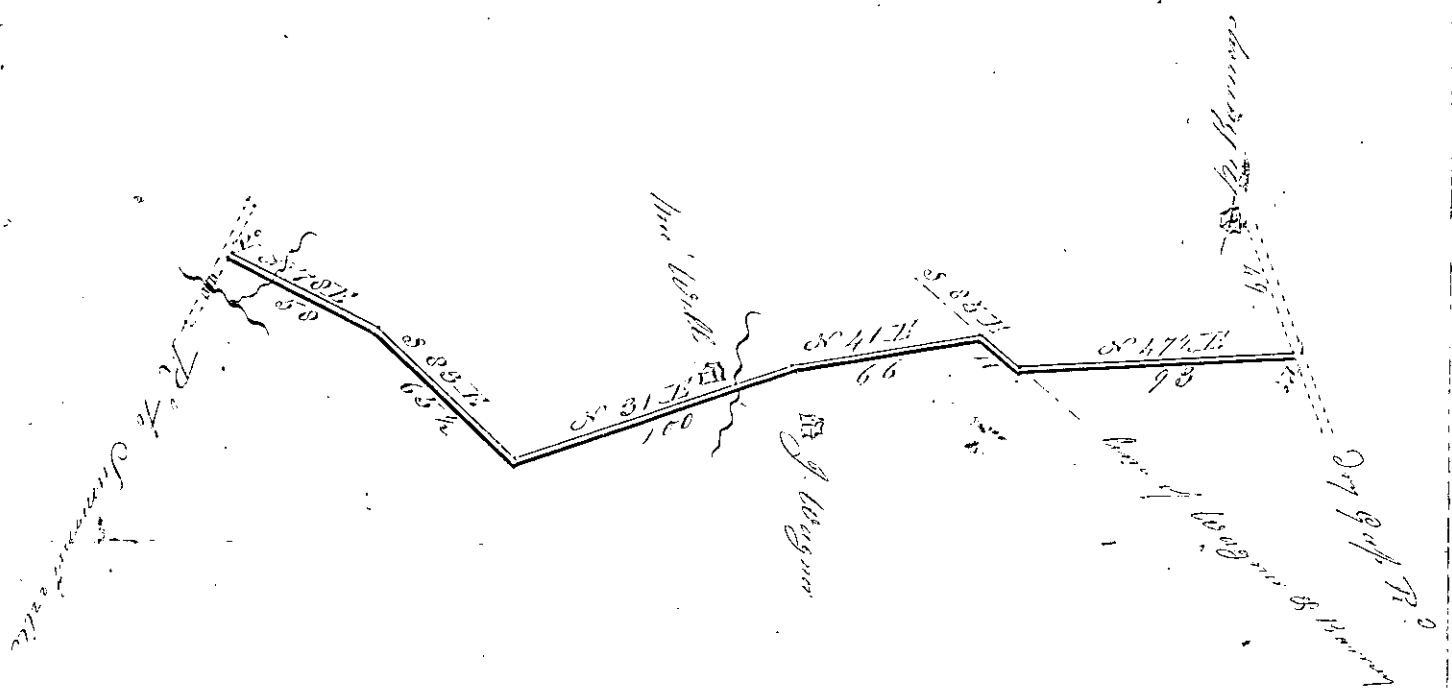

Upon the petition of Samuel Douglass,
Burgess of the Borough of Johnstown and a
majority of the members of the town Council of
said Borough, setting forth, that at a meeting
of the Burgess and town Council of the said
Borough duly held and convened it was or-
dained and enacted as follows, to wit, "that
a public street, forty feet wide to be known
as Frost Street, and extending from Walnut
Street to Market Street, the Northern line of
said street being the same as the Northern
line of Frost alley as at present established
be and the same is hereby ordained, declared
and established, a draft of said Street being
attached to said petition, exhibiting the loca-
tion of said street and the premises through
which it passes, And praying the Court
to appoint seven disinterested freeholders
of the said Borough of Johnstown, who after
being duly sworn or affirmed to perform their
duties under the act of Assembly passed

April 22nd AD 1856, with impartiality and
fidelity shall procure to view the premises
described in the above petition and acco-
mpanying draft, and through which the
said Board of Street is to pass, and perform
the several duties in the said act of Assembly
set forth and make report thereof according
