Defendant
John Taylor being produced, sworn and examined
on the part of the Petitioner, doth depose and say:

My name is John Taylor I am years of age;
I live within a quarter of a mile from James
M. Gallagher. I live on the same side of the
road in the same direction from Gallagher as
Oshell, Adair & Klein do. I live on the land
of Krebs & Wallace. I have lived there 12 yrs
on the end of the road. I live on the left of the
Oshell road going towards Wallace. My building
are not on any road. There is a timber road
comes down past my place, but these men
do not know it. It is there three years since
I worked on James Gallagher's place. I have
known it since then. At that time there
was a road come up from Wallace Mill past

when Valentine's Good now leads. After leaving
Good's it lead into the Oshall road. I have
been in that neighborhood all the time since
then except for 190. That road was used part
of the time not all. Part of the time it was
closed up, ^{I mean the Oshall road,} its open now. I mean by being
closed up that there was a fence across it.
Mr. Oshall Senior and Klein use what we
call the McKee road in going to Muller's Mill.
Mr. Gallagher also uses that road. I have
seen him hauling grain & such things as
that going to mill. I attend, generally, the
Beaver Valley Church. Muller is my nearest
mill. In going to church & mill I generally go
the McKee road. I have been using this road
ever since I have lived there. That road is
in reasonable condition, a man could wagon
it the last time I was along it. The McKee
road extends ~~to~~ ^{to} the chair through from McKee's
to the St Lawrence & Leavelle road. It inter-
sects with other roads to reach that point.
It intersects with the Oshall road. I live as
near Gallagher as Klein does but not quite as
near as Oshall. I would not call the McKee
road a log road. I suppose it is $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile
from Gallagher to the Leavelle road. I have not
been on the road in controversy lately; I don't once
this winter; on one piece of it, I have traveled
from Gallagher up to the ridge road; but I never
paid any particular attention to it. I have
been over the road from Gallagher down to the
church since of year. If that road were
kept open the McKee road would still be

newer for Oshall, Noel Klein and myself
to go to church and Walter's mill. The McKee
road is the better road of the two. Mr Gallagher
and Mr Baker could use the McKee road
to go to these points.

Cross-examined by Mr Evans

I live in the neighborhood of a mile from McKee's
blacksmith shop. We call the road running
past the blacksmith shop, intersecting the McKee
road, the Top road. The McKee road is not
a Township road. In going up past McKee's
Blacksmith shop over the McKee road you
would pass John Gills, Valentine Goods, (where
James Oshall now lives) Bakers and James
Gallagher, and then Krabb & Mullane) Bloom
place to reach the St. Lawrence road.

That whole road is known as the McKee road.
I know where Shuss's mill was. It was
down to the right of this road going towards
Beaver dally. The McKee road intersects the
St. Lawrence road at the Bloom place where
Rust Oshall lives. The road that passes Robt
Oshalls is the same that passes Noel's & Klein's.
Simon Noel & Klein live between Christopher Noel
& Oshall. I suppose it would be about 500
yds. from Klein to Rust Oshall's. Gallagher & Baker
wouldn't go past Rust Oshall's to get to Walter's mill.
If Gallagher & his neighbors would go out the
road from Gallagher to Klein they would
then have to go to mill by way of Christopher
Noel's, but they need not go out there.
If the road in controversy were closed up Gallagher

and his neighbors would not have to go round
by Christophers to church ~~to~~ be using
Trap roads, they could go the creek road.
The creek road is the one that goes down past
old James Oshalle. This is a much shorter
road. To get on to the creek road Gallagher
his neighbors could come up past Valentines
Goods. They would strike the Creek road at
James Oshalle's place on the Glen Cornell road.
From Gallagher to the Creek road would be
between $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile. It would not be
a log road that Gallagher and his neighbors
would have to use to get to the creek road.
It would not be a Trap road; part of it is
a Trap road, part of it is not. When you
strike the Oshalle place you strike the Trap
road. The roads at James Oshalle are the Chest
Creek & the Glen Cornell road. The Glen Cornell
road is the nearest to Gallagher. It intersects the
Chest Creek Trap road of course. It also intersects
the road across the creek at James Gills.
The Chest Creek road is not the one that passes
the Church & Mill (Halter). From Gallagher's to
Mill or Church by way of James Oshalle's would
be about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Part of the land
through which the McKee road passes is unimproved.
I have known the McKee road for 12 yrs. I don't
know very much about the road in controversy.
I know its a bad road. I was on it once
last winter - there was sledding then. I was
not on it all just part of it. I could not
say any thing about its condition for travel

during the last year. I under took to go down it about a year ago and my wife and I took the ridge road instead because it was too muddy. There has been a heap of improvement on it since I traveled it last. It was in the winter of the summer that my wife and I went to go down that road. We just went to see the roads. The road was so bad that we did not take the road but went up to the ridge road. My children attend the Matthew School House in Clearfield Co. I live in Clearfield Co. Bucaria Prop. Krebs & Hallage own the place I live on. Gallagher's children first went to the Matthew School & they were turned out, then they went to the Deener Valley School. Hechattin. I was subpoenaed by John Gill. I suppose it was by Mr. Shayer. Gill is a Constable.

Re-examined by Mr. Parker.

There is a couple of thousand yards from the Co. line I suppose. It might be further and probably not as far. Gallagher & his neighbors are going up past Klein's ^{go to} church would be going in a directly opposite direction from the church. I have ~~not~~ ^{not} know the road from Gallagher's up past ^{go to} Bloomer to have been traveled for about 33 yrs. From Union Hill to the Bloomer place along the St Lawrence road it about a 1/4 or 1/2 a mile.

Re-Cross-examined by Mr. Cairns

They have used this road for 33 yrs to haul produce out and it has grain &c

The first I hauled on it was Buckwheat.
The men hauling the buckwheat from the
Bloom plain to ^{the Miller place} where Gallagher lives, that
the road that intersects the McKee road. It
intersects the McKee road just above Valen-
tine Goods. The McKee road is the road Gal-
lagher travels to go to mill. That is his principal
road,

Septestis J. Luther (sworn)

I live in White Pop. I have lived there ten years
again the 1 Apr. I served one term as supervisor of
White Pop. I have been assessor for two years (I
am in my second year) I have been assistant
assessor once. I am the Pop. Clerk. The rate levied
for road purposes was 10 mills for this year. I
believe it has been the same rate for every
year I have been in the Pop. I know where the
road in controversy is. I made out the duplicate
for that part of the Pop. It was something over
\$300⁰⁰. It was \$324⁸⁴ ⁰⁰. Daniel Strayer is the
supervisor of that district this year. There is
no land assessed in White Pop on the seated
list with the name of Wallace ~~street~~. I don't
know about the unseated list. I was along
the road in controversy day before yesterday. It
is the only time I ever was along the road in
controversy. I have had experience in building
roads aside from my position as supervisor.
I was over the McKee road day before yesterday
I was over the McKee road between McKee

blacksmith shop and James M. Gallagher's.
I also traveled over the road from Mr. Gallagher's
house to the road in controversy. The character
of the ground from Gallagher's private road
over the road in controversy to the Beaver Valley
church is dark loam, its wet sandy ground.
The ground over which the McKee road runs
is slate and gravel-day ground. To make
the road in controversy from Gallagher's private
road to the Beaver Valley Church as dry as the
McKee road, I would not take the contract
for \$1500⁰⁰ for the reason that nothing but
stone would make it and I believe it would
take stone three feet thick to make it as
solid as the McKee road. The McKee road
is in pretty fair condition if fact it was the
best road I was on from the time I left home
that day until I got back and I traveled
on public roads all the time. The grade is
not bad there are a couple of short hills
on it but they are not as bad as some of
the hills you find on our main roads.
The road from Gallagher's house down to the
road in controversy is very bad indeed. There
is one place that the little run in it runs
right along on the road. It is fully as steep
if not steeper than the McKee road. I have
traveled the ridge road off and on for the last
20 yrs. I believe the ridge road is the best
road in the north of the County. That is from
St. Lawrence to Walker's mill. It is in the same
condition from the forks at Christopher's mill

to the Beaur Dams church. I paid some attention
to the ground between the ridge road
and the road in controversy at the point
when the private road of Gallagher comes
out on it. In my opinion there could be a
very good road made across there at very
small expense. To make a good road there
it would be necessary to make grade of about
40 rods. I believe it would take \$1000 to
make the road in controversy from Gallagher to
the Beaur Valley Church passable at all seasons
of the year as good as other public roads.
And then there would be time when you
could not haul some things on it. It
is mere guess work to make an estimate
of what it would cost to make a road
like that good. I mean by that, that in
my opinion the ground is so bad that a
man might fall far short on his estimate.
The general condition of the roads in Whit Sup is
bad. The tax has not been sufficient to keep
them in repair. We have one road from
Beaur Dams to Glendale that it is very
seldom we have enough tax to work on it
and it is one of our principal outlets from
Beaur Dams to Coalport. It is the principal
road to the Coalport market for the people
from the corner of Chest & Clearfield Twp.
Besides the McKee road Mr. Gallagher has
a road leading out past Thomas Evans,
a very fair road for a private road, and
still another that leads to or interests the

creek road about something near a 1/4 of a mile before Maltus mill. This road past Evans also intersects the Creek road. Neither of these is the road James Oshell lives on. The Creek road is a public road. It runs from Maltus mill to Gill crossing. Salway considered it a public road. It is between 60 & 80 rods between when the Creek road intersects the mill road and when the McKee road intersects it. I find on the Pop book \$340.09 of outstanding orders, \$72.56 is on the Supervisor, and \$267.53 on the Co. Commissioners. I find these orders issued and not marked paid. The Auditors settlement has been made for this year. I did not go over the McKee road from Gallaghers up to the Bloom place.

Excess-examined by Mr. Evans

I do not live in that end of the Pop. When I made this examination I had Mr. Stanger with me to show me these roads. I asked him to go with me. Mr. Stanger was up at my house and as I understood him Mr. Gill the Constable had sent him there to serve a subpoena. and as I had never been over the road in controversy I wanted to see it as well as other roads leading to James M. Gallagher, I asked him to go with me and show me those roads. I asked him because I did not know where the roads were. I had been on foot to Gallagher on official business but had always gone short cuts and did not know the roads. I was subpoenaed to come here and

quite in evidence and I wanted to know something about the roads before I testified. I went to see these roads just because I wanted to be informed. Mr. Stayer told me they were going to take depositions here before arguments heard, and that that was what I was subpoenaed for. So I asked him to go with me. And will say further that Mr. Stayer did not try to influence me. Mr. Stayer told me some time before - about election day - that they would have to take more testimony and it might be necessary for me to go down and see ~~these~~ those roads. I have had enough to do with roads that I can tell very nearly what it will cost to make them by the kind of ground they run over. I am aware that all Twp roads are in extremely bad condition just at this time of the year. To a great extent all Twp roads are almost impassable at this time of year. It depends on the kind of ground they are made on. All the roads do not present such a state of things now as to make you think they would all have to be stoned. I undertake to say that the road in controversy is on wet sandy ground, when all the roads are wet now, because I saw springs spouting out all along this road, and there had been a ditch dug along this road and I could see the character of the soil. All other county roads are not in the condition. There are other Twp roads along which springs are gurgling

out at this season of the year. The McKee road is on high ground - on a ridge. There has been travel on it. It could not be traveled much. There are not many to travel it. It is not a public road. There are none of the road I speak of in the immediate neighborhood of Gallagher's that are public roads. I would not risk riding a horse on the road in controversy today. I could not say that of other Pub roads. My reason that I would not travel this road in controversy is that when I passed over it day before yesterday that the frost had holed it up so that I don't believe it would be safe to ride over it. As far as I know every other Pub road would be safe to travel over. This road is ditched on one side. It was not ditched to make a road but to repair it so that they could haul back over it last summer. They had thrown poles across it to shut ^{up} mud holes in it. There might be some ravines but they don't generally put poles over them they bridge. This road from where the private road of Gallagher comes out on the road in controversy to the ridge road could either be made up the ravine or a side cut up the hill. To build it up the ravine I believe it would be about 500 yds from the point where the Gallagher road comes out. In my estimation it would not be too steep to go straight at the ravine to make an ordinary good

road. And a very good road could be made
by grading up the side of the hill. To go
up the avenue would not be any steeper
than a couple of hills on the St. Augustine
and Phillipsburg road. In going over this
ground I went up from the road in
controversy. The steep place I spoke of on Gal-
lagher's private road is between the road
in controversy and Gallagher's house. You
would be coming down hill in coming
from Gallagher to the road in controversy.
In making estimates of what it would cost
to make these roads one might over estimate
the costs. I am not certain that the creek road
is a Pub road, ^{I don't pay it} ~~the Pub is~~ indebted to the
amount of outstanding orders testified to.
The report of the Co. Auditor shows that that
County owes White Pub some amount but
I do not know how much. I was not Pub
Clerk last year. I was at the Pub Auditor's
settlement this Spring. There was nothing done
with these outstanding orders. One of the Super-
visors had paid \$80⁰⁰ and we gave him credit
for that amount. He had nothing to pay the
balance with. I can't say whether the amount
due the Pub by the Co. would pay these out-
standing orders or not. White Pub has no
other indebtedness except what
is contracted for roads that I know of. I have
never been supervisor of this end of the
Pub. I was of the upper end. I did not
know much of this road in controversy

before I went to examine it. I have
traveled the other roads. I had not been
on the private roads I spoke of. There are
two of them I never traveled, one of them
I traveled in part.

Re-examined by Mr. Parker.

John D. Gill was one of the Prop Auditors last
year. Mr. Gill had subpoenaed me and
brought me here when they took deposi-
tions in this case last Dec. Mr. Gill had
asked me to go and look at these roads be-
fore Mr. Stearns. The \$80⁰⁰ I spoke of the
supervisor paying is not a part of the \$340⁰⁰.
The Prop settlement was on the 12 of Mar. this year.
The Co. Aud. make their settlement in January.

Re-cross-examined by Mr. Evans.

The last settlement of the Co. Aud. showed that
the Prop has assets. There were no other
assets to my knowledge. The settlement ^{of Prop Aud.}
did not show that there was funds in
the hands of the supervisors. This Prop
indebtedness was incurred by one work on
the roads; personal services of Supervisor, dynamite
for blowing stumps out of roads, scoops,
to the Prop Aud. for services. There is also
a scoop & plough bought that there
has been no order issued for. This indebted-
ness has not been contracted within the last
year. One of these orders was issued in 1886.
There was no provision made for paying
this indebtedness in buying the last rates.

Re-examined by Mr. Parker.

One of these roads was raised in 1855, It was for \$69³⁷/₁₀₀.

S. J. Luther

Isaiah Gates (sworn).

My land joins the ridge road. It is probably 40 rods from my building to the road. I have a private road out to the ridge road. Besides myself there is Cash, Joel Gates, Geo. E. Gans, Henry Gates, & shops lining along the ridge road between Christophers and the Pease Valley Church. The use the ridge road is going to mill and church. There are several little places along this road that drifts. These ~~is only place between~~ ~~back and~~ ~~and~~ It drifts almost every winter between back and us. And except that their road has always been open except one winter (since 1863 when we moved there) when it was drifted near Joel Gates. When the road between me and back is drifted they usually go through the fields. There is one place on the road between back and me ^{where the} ~~that the~~ ~~fences are~~ not over 20 feet apart. I don't think. Some places it is wider. It don't run regular. To the best of my knowledge you could always go along the road during the winter time either on the road or through the fields. They would have to go through the fields 30 or 40 rods. I have seen this road in condition since 1865. I hauled logs and timber on it. A good bit of the ground over which it passes is soft wet loamy shanty

grained. It would be wet & shabby from the lower end up pretty well towards Mr. Scales, the end next Scales is the hardest. It has been used principally for lumbering purposes. I have been over a good bit - been over the most of the ground between the ^{ridge} road and the road in Contonery, hewing & stook. I don't think that a road from where Gallagher's road comes out on the road in Contonery up to the ridge road would be any steeper than the roads on any side of the ridge road - than my lane ^{& Cuske's} up to the ridge road. I think that a road could be constructed up to the ridge road without much expense. I think that a road could be made up there that you could haul loaded wagons up. I have hauled 40 bushels of wheat up my lane and I don't ^{think} that that would be any steeper.

Cross-examined by Mr. Evans.

I think that a road could be made up the draft; of course it it would not be exactly straight but it would be pretty near straight up the hill. By draft I mean a ravine. The ridge road is on higher ground than the road in Contonery. The distance from the ridge road down to the Gallagher road would probably be ^{or 50} about 40 rods. There was considerably work hauled over the road in Contonery last fall. Mr. Beers had the job of hauling. They hauled the bark to Plymouth city. If they had made

a road at that draft they might have come up on the city's roads instead. Adam East adjains me. I am a relative of Mr Strayer by marriage for are Cousins by marriage.

Isaiah Gate

Mr. Parker offers in evidence the Assesments of the seated and unseated lands in White Twp for the 1888.

By agreement of Counsel - A. V. Parker Esq. & Alvin Evans Esq. - the following witness was examined in this case on excluded Rule on Saturday Mar 31, 1888.

J. A. Macmaster (Sworn)

I was one of the viewers on an order to view & locate a road ordered to do 4th Mar 9, 1887 P. P. I was up the road from Mr Keir Slacksmith shop up past James Gallagher to Valentines Good's. I have also been down the road from James Gallagher leading past Evans' to the creek. I have made a sketch of the Mr. Keir road and the road past Evans' relative to the road in controversy.

Sketch produced by witness offered in evidence by Mr. Parker. Which is marked "Exhibit A" and identified by signature of Statary.

The road from the creek up to Evans' extends on Westward from there. Joseph M. Gallagher lives on the road after you pass Evans.

Cross examined by Mr. Evans.

I could not see all of the remaining portions

of the Mt. Kees road from Gallagher to the Park
road from Gallagher ^{Groves}. I did not chain these
roads.

Paul Gahner being produced, sworn and examined on the part of the Executors & Re-views, doth depose and say:

My name is Paul Gahner; am years of age;

I was on the re-view of this road from Christopher Maell's to the Beaver Dams. On the 8 of Aug last summer. After we got down to the School House on the road in controversy we chained from that up to the Church, and from the Church up the Ridge Road - I believe they call it - to the board above Christ Maell's; thence down a public road which they say leads to Coalport to Mr Maell's; thence to Union Mills opposite John Kline we left that road; measured over to James Gallagher; thence to the road in controversy at a point near the house of a man named Baker. Traversed said road ran up the hill to the public road they call

the Ridge Road. I made a draft of the work
I made that day and the road in Controversy.
The courses and distances on the road in Controversy
was only the distance on the balance.
(Draft shows witness) This is a copy of the road
that we ~~made~~^{run} that day and a sketch of the
running we did besides that.

Draft, identified by the witness, offered in
evidence which is marked "Exhibit A"
and identified by signature of testimony.

Question: State what would be the distance - in
steeking from James Gallagher - following the
dotted line out to John Klein, and from
John Klein up the road leading from Christ
falls to the land board, and down the Ridge
Road to the Church?

Mr. Parker objects that the distance between
the points and over the route mentioned
is immaterial to this issue, and further
that the same being shown by the draft
offered in evidence, the same can be as-
certained by the Court from said draft.

Ans: It would be three miles and a half
and twenty rods.

The dotted line on the draft from James Gallagher
to the road in controversy represents what I
suppose is a private road between the two
points. There is a high steep hill between the
point on the road in controversy where the Gallagher
road comes out and the ridge road. A
feasible road could not be made up that
hill; that is not to go with a wagon or a
horse. A path might be made to walk

ordained up. The dotted line from James Gallaghu to Klivers passes over an old path, which I was told had been used for a log road. The part of the road in controversy from where the Gallaghu road comes out on it to the School House was (when I was on it) in passable condition: about as good as the average newly opened road and better than some, I think I have been on worse ones, I mean newly opened public roads. I saw, when we were running these roads, what they told me was Walter's Mill. From the School House down to Walter's Mill looked to me some where near a quarter of a mile. I think that Walter's Mill is on one side of the public road leading to Flynn City. It is near the road. In running from John Klivers to James Gallaghu the improvement of Valentine Good was pointed out to me. They told me he lived there but I am not sure whether I saw his house. His cleared land, I think, joins Gallaghu's. I will note on the draft in pencil the cleared land of Valentine Good - (Draft marked by witness)


Cross-examined by A. V. Barker Esq.

I did not take the bearings of any of the roads except the road in controversy. I did not go down to Walter's Mill - not further down than the School House. The Ridge Road was dry and in good order at the time I was on it. I think the Ridge Road is a good road. There is a pretty strong grade toward the lower end

of it, but its a good road. The grade I sketch
of is right at the end - a short distance above
the Church. It was pretty dry weather when
I was there. I think it was before that rainy
season come up. The summer up to the time
I was on the road had been unusually dry.
There had been some work done on the road
in connection that year but I think not very
recently. I compare the road with newly
opened Top roads because it was in that
condition. I did not take the levels from the
road in connection to the Ridge Road. It would
be pretty hard to do. I dont think a road could
possibly be made up there on account of
the high grade. A road could be made from
the road in connection where the Gallagher road
comes out up to the Ridge Road by grading
along the hill ^{along distance} a side cut. It would be
very expensive though. I made no exami-
nation to see how long a distance it would
be to make a side hill road up there. It
is all woodland when I measured between
the two roads except an old commons on the
top of the hill near the Ridge Road. The greater
part of the land on the South side of the
Ridge Road is improved land. There are
several farms along there. I dont just know
how many. It was Christopher Hale that told
me the log road I spoke of was a log road. I
made this draft sometime in the beginning of
December I think. I had no measurement
of the roads lying north of the one in

controversy except my field notes and the names of the parties living along the roads from which to make the draft. I don't say that the roads lying north of the road in controversy are exactly correct as to their bearing - I only had the distances, I think they are about right at the ends and it may vary a little in the middle - not much though.

Christopher Sael being produced, sworn and examined
on the part of the Excepts and re-view, doth depose and say:

My name is Christopher Sael; am years of age;
I reside in White Twp. I have lived there 30 odd
years. I moved there in July 1853 and have lived
there ever since. I have been Supervisor of
White Twp. I served two terms. This year
and two years ago. I know the public road
leading from my place past David Strayer
The Lane town. Supervisor in our Twp. The Twp
is divided into two districts. When Supervisors
are elected they decide between themselves
what roads they shall take. The road from
my place to Strayer is in my district. I have
frequently been along this road in controversy.
In fact often this summer. When we had any
business down that way we generally met.

that way. This road was ~~opened~~ ^{opened} in 1862
and the order ~~reversed~~ ^{reversed} in 1863 I think. It was
open at the time the view was made it
was cut open for a timber road. It has
been shut up at the lower end for several
years, by people clearing down there. About
the time Gray came there it was all
woods until you struck the Glen Ormell
road, then Gray cleared and the road
was closed where he made his clearing.
I know where the lands of Judge ^{Reeder} are that
lie along this road. They lie a little up
and off to the right of Gallagher's land they
join Gallagher's land. These lands lie above
the private road used by Gallagher to get
out to this public road. Mr. Teers had a
job there this summer and he hauled very
heavy loads of bark out through this to the
Flynn City road. Then the Fall when they
were hauling I considered it as good a
road as any in the Topi. I saw on. It
would not take much expense to make
this a passable road. In the summer when
they hauled ~~over~~ ^{over} this road it compared
about as well ^{as} any of the Topi roads. Of course
when it rained they would dig it out
with the heavy loads but just as they would
on any other road. I know where James Gal-
lagher lives. Gallagher's neighbors are Mr. Baker
& Mrs. Good, living close by, and John
Klein's next and Samson Abel. Mr. Penning-
ton lives right there too. They would use
this road in Autumn in going to school

Church and Mill. It is the only public road they could use. I know of a log road coming up past Mr. Kees blacksmith shop. Mr. Malters used it in his day for getting logs in. There was a road that run through Mr. Malters land away out to the Chest Creek road a sort of a bridle path. Mr. Gill has ^{made} a clearing and shut that road up, ^{then one of them is a log road} there is no log road there. This bridle road, or what road, led a little to the west, from Mr. Kees shop. That is not the road that leads to Gallagher. Mr. Gill did not clear across the road from Mr. Kees past Gallagher. I dont consider as there is only road up from Mr. Kees to Gallagher I consider them just drag roads for the convenience of people getting their timber out. It would cost a good bit to open a road over this log road from Mr. Kees to Gallagher. I dont know just how much. It ^{would} ~~was~~ be expensive to take out stumps along this road; and hillside cuts and digging through the woods. It is hilly along this road. There are reasonable steep hills. There is up and down in it; steep and short chucks, through them woods. There was wagoning done on that road from Gallagher to Chest creek. I dont know of any way being done on the road from Gallagher to Mr. Kees

I know of Mr. Shurs having a saw mill in that country. I dont know whether Mr Shurs hauled any lumber from that mill down over the road past McKees stop. If the public road in controversy were closed up there would be no public road for Gallagher and his neighbors to get to church, school, Mill and Flynn City. I know of Mr. Shurs hauling lumber to Coalport. To get out on the Coalport road to took a North West course from Jimmy Gallagher and we all helped him to make a road. He got on to the Coalport road. The road from the mill to the Coalport road is not a public road. I know what is called the ridge road. The distance from Gallagher over the road Shurs hauled his lumber past the Bloom place and then past my place and down to Flynn City would be in the neighborhood of six miles if not over it. To the school & church over that way would be something over 5 miles to the best of my belief. From Gallagher to the Coalport road over the road used by Shurs, Gallagher & his neighbors would have to travel over a mile. I am familiar with the ground between Gallagher and the Ridge road going south. From Gallagher over to the Ridge road would be about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile. After you cross this bottom, between his place and the ridge road, is a steep hill. You could not get a public road across there unless you would

go straight up the mountain. It would
take about \$600 to make the whole road in contri-
versy from my place to the other public road
as good ^{real} ~~as~~ another road. Its about as good
as the principle part of our Park roads now.
I believe you could make this road in contri-
versy as good as the ordinary Park roads with-
out the use of stone. It is passable for teams
and horses in its present condition. I think
in my judgment that the road is necessary
for public use. I know Joel N. Tates. He
is a Brother-in-law of Daniel Strayer.

Cross-examined by Mr. Tucker.

This road in controversy comes out on the pub-
lic road about forty rods from my home
on my place. The ridge road - or Glen Connell
road from Glen Connell to the Deane Lane
Church was open when I came there in 1855.
Its a good road. Its one of the best in our sec-
tion. I was along this road in controversy
10 or 15 times during the summer. Mr. Beers
worked on the road to get his logs and
bark out. He fixed it up in good shape.
Part of the road in controversy was as good
as part of the Ridge road. Part was not as
good. They hauled ^{or} heavy loads out on it
as forty hundred, some hauled a little
over forty hundred. I did not haul any
myself. I saw some of Beers loads of
bark. I went down there (when I went)
on foot. I had been traveling on this road
in summer before this summer. I never

traveled this road in controversy with a wagon
Mr. Gallagher has a road built from his home
over to this road in controversy. I dont know as
they stopped hauling on account of the road,
this summer. I know that they stopped
hauling on account of the rain but dont
know that it was on account of the road.
Mr. Beers stopped me from skidding back
on account of the rain. I dont know
of any one in particular using this road as
a wagon road until Mr. Beers fixed it
except Mr. Gallagher he wagoned some.
It was not used, in the summer by any
one except Gallagher to my knowledge.
Mr. Pennington has a ^{team} team now. Mr. Good has
one horse, Mr. Boster has none. Mr. Pennington
got his team this Fall. Its a good spell since
I know of Mr. Good having one here. I dont
know what he has just now. He generally
keeps one horse. Its all he needs. Part of
this road in controversy was as good last
summer when they wagoned on it as the
Glen Cornell road. The Principle part of
the road from Beers Creek down to Shays,
about a mile and a quarter of it, was
just about as good. That is as good as
part of the Glen Cornell road. Along
where Geo. Gears lives on the Glen Cornell
road is low flat ground and the teams
cut it up just about as bad as in this
^{new} new road. That is the part of the Glen Cornell
road that I compare the road in controversy

with, there is part of the Glen Cornell road that
is as bad as any of that road that Peers
hauled on. One the flat above Nathan Gator
farm is the place I mean. Klein and Abel
live on the Coalport road. A quarter of a
mile from my house to the fork when the
Coalport road leaves the ridge road. John
Klein lives about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from my place
and Simon Abel, lives about 80 rods this
side of Klein up towards our place. Klein
lives in Clearfield Co. Klein sends his children
^{to school} into Clearfield Co. Abel ~~does~~ does not send his
children to school. He has no place to send
them unless through the woods. They attend
church at Glen Cornell. I have not been
down on the road past McKee for a
long time. I was up on a log road there
~~there~~ this summer. I don't know what
the McKee road is. There is nothing there
but old log roads. Mr. Shum was sawing
Gallagher timber and some he bought from
Shaw and Krebs and some of John Kleins
of Inristake road. The road I helped build
lead him over into the Coalport road. We
got onto an old road about Gallaghers that
used to lead into Osbells dead water, that
lead out to the Coalport road. Osbells
dead water is about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile down
from McKees. There is a good ^{Road} path from
McKees to the dead water. I don't know
of any Supervisors working on this road in
Cantonway.

Re. examined by Mr. Evans.

The logs derived from the properties lying along this road from my place down to Strayer would keep the road in repair. I believe, there is no Pub road between this Pub road and the Co. line, Mr. Gallagher runs between the Co. line and this road. It would be something over two miles from Sherris mill up past Gallagher ~~road~~ to the public road and up the public road to my place and down the Caulton road to where the saw mill road intersects it. Part of the ridge road drifts up in winter between me and Isaac Gates we have to take the fields.

Re-cross examined by Mr. Barker.

It's about eighty rods from Mr. Gallagher to the Co. line. It might be a little more, but it's thereabouts. During the time we hauled lumber in the winter on this road it was used as a mill road, on account of the ridge road drifting up between me and Isaac Gates; In fact we always use our timber roads on that account. It's only used then when we would be logging there in the winter, I milled on the road different winter seasons.

L. T. W. Barker Noel

William Baker. Sworn.

I live in White Post adjoining Mr. Gallagher. I know where the public road is leading down past Strayer, i.e. the one coming down

from Christopher's land. I own a property along
the line of that road. I moved there sometime
in last Aug. I have traveled on this road.
I moved in there and I hauled corn fodder
and corn and I hauled lumber on it. I hauled
the corn fodder and corn in there last fall and
the lumber I hauled at the time of that
wet spell before the snow come. There is
no other public road there that I can travel
to get down to Flynn City. We have a private
road through my land to get on this public
road. It's the same road that Mr. Gallagher
uses to get out on the public road. It is the
same road as is used by Mr. Good and
Chumright to get out on the public road. I
consider this road from what I wagoned
over it just about as good as the Park roads.
I have known the Park road from the Beacon
Village School House to the other side of Mallett's
Mill to be in worse condition. I have
wagoned on both. Mr. Beers hauled bark
out over this road this last summer and
fall. He hauled the bark from Shaw &
Krebs' land. These lands are above where
my private road intersects the public road.
That is the road I would use in going to
church, school & to Flynn City. The School
House is convenient to the church, a very
short distance apart. I go occasionally to church
I don't attend regularly. That is the only
road that my neighbors have to go to mill
& Flynn City. I seen Mr. Gallagher & Shelton

I will haul back on this road this
last fall. I know where the ridge road is.
It would be about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile direct from
my place to the ridge road. There would be
no ground to build a road or there at all
unless you went straight up the mountain,
after you would get through the flat - a short
distance. The ridge road is in very bad con-
dition in the winter time. That is in some
places ^{It drifts very bad.} I have hauled this road in winter
very up to Christ Auld. I travel it every
night and morning, when I am working.
The road is open all the way through but
the upper part is not quite open on the
line but its open, I have wagoned it
too. I think in my judgment that this
road in controversy is necessary for public
use.

Cross examined by Mr. Parker.

The upper part of the road Mr. Auld has
shut up but he has opened a road so
you can get through. I mean by not
being on the line that it is not on the
line is laid out. Mr. Auld has the upper
end of this road fenced in and cultivated.
I go up and down the road night and
morning to my work at Kettuffs. I am
married to a Kettuff. I hauled the corn
and fodder and coal from Kettuffs. I
raise the corn up there. I thought if I went
around by the other end of the road I could
get around better than if I hauled back

trails. I knew that Mr. Burns had been repairing on the lower end of the road. I hauled some lumber from Flynn's mill and from Ed. McKay's. I have been over the upper end of the road pretty often with a wagon. I never went up that way with any but an empty wagon my load was always fetched the other way. I have been acquainted with the ridge road eight or ten years but I never wagoned it until last fall a year. The lumber I hauled was the lumber used in building my house. I built the house in Aug. just after harvest. When my wife goes to church she goes to St. Lawrence, I have attended services at the Beaman dam church since I lived where I do now. I don't know how many families I have seen the Gallaghs ^{children going to} ~~family~~ at Sunday school. I did not see them at Sunday school. I have walked across from where my road intersects the road in controversy to the ridge road. Two-thirds of the distance from my place to the ridge road is hilly. I guess it's a little over a mile from where my road comes out down to the Beaman dam road. It's a short distance for I can walk it in 15 minutes. I bought my land from Joe Michaels. I have fifty acres. The deed is all right as soon as it's paid for. I have been down the wagonway I speak of on the upper road all along. When I get a team to haul any thing home I always take the team out that way. I haul the load

which ever ways the nearest, then I hauled
the corn & fodder the other way it was not the
nearest but the most convenient to get it
in when I was by myself. I do not keep
a team, I have none yet. I will get one as
soon as I get a stable. I have gone from the
Coalport road down past Gallagher's to my
place. I ~~have~~ hauled a load that way. I
was coming from the Matthews mill. Its
not a very good road. I can hardly tell just
where Matthews mill is, because it is strange
country to me. Its down off the Coalport
road. After you get out on the Coalport
road you go towards Sivona in going to
Matthews mill. I dont think it would be
as near in coming from Kullieffs to my
place to go down the Coalport road and
then down past Gallagher's as to go to the
Beaver dams and then up the road in
continencey.

Re-examined by Mr. Evans.

The road from the Coalport road past Gal-
lagher is the Shurs road. There is some timber
along the road in continencey. John Lill has
some, and Mr. Gallagher and there is some
scattered over the Shaw & Krebs land and
Michael has some, W. H. Baker.

Simon Noel, sworn.

I live on the road leading from Glen Cornell
to Coalport. I know of the road leading
from Christ. Noel's dam to Daniel Stoyers

I have traveled over that road. I know
where Mr. Gallagher lives, Gallagher's neighbor
an Mr. Baker, John Pinnington & Valentine Good.
They have never ^{public} had to get to Malters Mill
and Flynn City but the road is continuing
I know where the school house is. The school
house is on the Dixon dam road. That
is the school that the children from this
neighborhood would have to attend. It
is my school district too. I think in my
judgment that this road is continuing as
necessary for public use. I know of Mr
Toel, Geo. Toel, & John Sprankle, hauling bark
on this road. They were hauling for Geo Toens.
I was last along this road about one month
ago. They were hauling the bark from the
Krebs & Shaw land. This road was about
as good as the common run of the roads
i.e. the common run of Top roads. It's open
clear through from the road past my father
to the road past Strayers except a little
piece closed up by my father and he
has left a road to get through. There
are gate ways on the lower end of the
road on land of Daniel Strayer. There
was woods on the lower end of the road
until Strayer owned it and then he cleared
and fenced in the road. I know where
the ridge road is. I suppose it would be
about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile distant from Gallagher
& Baker to the ridge road. You could
not ^{make} a road up that way at all. The

hill is too steep Part of the ridge road in the winter season is drifted shut and in bad condition. In the winter season when the road is closed we have to go around through the fields to get to mill. There is no other road. The road in controversy is used by trains in the winter time by parties going to mill. I know where the Shes road is. There is no road down past Mr Kees blacksmith shop except an old log road. If the road in controversy were closed up Mr Gallagher and his neighbors would have no public road to go to church, school mill & Adyona city. I have not been over the whole length of the log road past Mr Kees for some time. but I was on the upper end of it on Monday and it was all shut up with logs.

Cross-examined by Mr Parker.

I dont know whose logs were across the road. They are saw logs. I dont know when they are going to haul them out, besides there some old stuff there too. These logs were over a mile from the Coalbents road. I have never hauled anything out over the road past Mr Kees except saw logs, that I hauled for Mr Walters off his land. I never went over that road in going to Walter Mill. When I go to mill in winter time I use the road in controversy and in summer I have to go way around the other way. I never

know the road that comes across below
McKees past Enans in going to mill. I
couldnt tell what road Mr. Gallagher
has been using to go to mill. The ridge
road drifts for, I suppose, near a mile.
It drifts from the point where the Coalport
road leaves it down to Sarah Gates land
and Mr. Joel Gates - through his property.
It drifts from the lane between Gates & Galt,
forms. It drifts ^{shut} every winter. It drifts
on the Beamer Valley hill on the ridge road.
From the first point it drifts for a half mile
right in succession along there. Its impos-
sible until its shoveled open. It would be
impossible all winter if ^{it} were not worked
on. They keep it open part of the time by
shoveling. I helped to keep it open my-
self. Part of the road in continuing that they
have been working on is as good ^{as} the other
other roads in the Towp in which the Ouper
men have been working for years. I went
over it a foot a month ago. It has been
used as a mill road at times in the
winter when it was kept open by the
logging. It is not kept open in the winter
for travel except when it is used for lumber
and logging. It is not over four years since
my father shut up the end of the road.
He has a pair of bars and a fence across
the road. The bars are at the road and
the fence at the East end of his clearing.
I have walked up to the ridge road from

when Gallagher's road comes out on the road
in Controversy, I have never measured the
distance. I have been over the road in contro-
versy frequently this summer. I walked over
it and was over it with a horse - horse back
It twenty years since I did the logging for
Mr. Walter. W. IRWIN PAUL

James M. Gallagher sworn.

I live convenient to the road in Controversy
I have lived there for 22 years. My next
convenient neighbors are John Pennington,
James Oshall, Simon Paul, John Klein (he
is in Charfield Co.) & Wm. Baker. I have
been along the road in Controversy pretty
often this summer. I hauled something
over six car loads of bark over it this
summer. I hauled the bark to Flynn City
If this road in Controversy had been closed
I would have had to haul it up the hill
to the road they call the Mc Kee road and
then turn to the left and down by Mr.
Evans. They are just old log roads. I
would have no public road on which
to haul out my bark. Besides if the road
in Controversy were closed, I use the road
in Controversy in going to mill. It is the
nearest and best road to church, school
and Flynn City. Besides myself Mr.
Bess hauled - several persons hauled
for him. There is some few roads better
than the one in Controversy and some that's worse

I used this road before it was closed up
by Mr. Stayer. After he closed it up I
had to go down over the hill past McKee
or down past Ennis. These roads are
not Pop roads. I know the road they
have been calling the ridge road.
The ground from my place to the ridge
road is good enough but the hill is too
steep you could not get up there at all.
I have walked up the road in controversy
from when ~~it was~~ my road intersects it
to Chest Hill. I believe in my judgment
that the road in controversy is necessary
for public use; ~~It would~~ - my self
and neighbors - ^{could} ~~would~~ not use any
public road in going to school, Church,
Flynn City & Mill, if the one in contro-
versy were closed up because we would
not have any. I am acquainted with
the Sherr road, I helped make ^{it}. It runs
nearly north towards Coalport. It was
built to haul out lumber. It is not a
public road. I am acquainted with the road
leading down past McKee blacksmith
shop. It is an old log road. It is not
passable now. There are saw logs hauled
across it. It is between my place and McKee.
Mr. Gill cleared across the log road. He
named the road over next to Stayer and
then he hauled it full of saw logs.
You couldn't get down there last winter.
I think the saw logs were Mr. Gills. The

ground over which the McKee road passes is all right but the hill is too steep. The right ridge road is all right as long as there is no storm. I suppose it drifted up now.

Ques: State whether or not the road from Christian Falls to intersect the Beaman Dam branch of the Clearfield Creek on land of Gen Pierce in White Twp is the same as that now in controversy?

Ans: I don't understand that question. I have in my possession the original order to open the road in controversy. The road referred to in the above question from Christian Falls to intersect the Beaman Dam branch of the Clearfield Creek on land of Gen Pierce in White Twp is the road in controversy.

(Mr. Evans offers in evidence the report of viewers upon an order to open a public ^{road} from Christian Falls to intersect the Beaman Dam branch of Clearfield Creek on land of Gen Pierce in White Twp. Confirmed absolutely 9 Dec. 1863)

Ques: State whether or not the road ~~leading~~ ^{intersecting} from a public road leading from Glen Cornell to Clearfield Creek and intersecting with a public road leading from the Beaman Dam saw mill to Benj. Byers' at or near the saw mill of Gen. Walter is the same as the public road called the ridge road.

Ans: It is the same.

(Mr. Evans offers in evidence the report

of viewers upon an order to open the public road referred to in the preceding question Confirmed absolutely on the — day of — month 1849.)

Cross-examined by Mr. Parker.

I moved to where I now live immediately after I was married. I am a son of Joseph M. Gallagher. James Oshell lives on the left hand side of the old log road that runs down past M'Kee, between me and M'Kee. It's about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from M'Kee. Oshell does not own the land where he lives. I suspect I did use the M'Kee road some before Shays closed up the end of the road in controversy. The M'Kee road was not altogether there when I went there. There was an old timber road, there, and me and Geo Oshell cut it out, part of it, so ^{we} you could go down with a wagon. The M'Kee road did not reach clear to my land when I went there so that you could get through with a wagon. I don't, mind just when I cut this road out, I don't mind whether it was shortly after I went there or when I cut it out. I haint been down that road with a wagon since Mr. Gilt made his clearing. Before that I some times used that road and sometimes the road in controversy and sometimes the road past Evans. It was a year ago last summer

since Mr. Gell made that clearing I think I am not positive. I had not used the road in controversy much before last summer with a horse and wagon. I used to drive a team of oxen over it ^{with a cart} sometimes. I never drove over it with a loaded wagon until last summer, because I had nothing to haul; there was no market for buck there at Flynn City. You could not get up a road made straight up from my place to the ridge road. You might make a side hill road up to the ridge road if you had money enough, and authority. ~~This~~ road up past Beaman dam to Glendale is worse in some places than the one in controversy. I mean after you pass Glendale going up to where Char Gaumbner used to live. It runs through the woods from Glendale to Gaumbner. I don't know how ^{many} years it has been opened. I don't know what the reason the road is not in a better condition is because the Supervisor hasn't the money to work on it. I have never been Supervisor. It would not be as far to go by the road in controversy to mill with a wagon as to go up over ^{the} hill and down the M^c Kee road. There is not much difference in the distance but considerable in the roads. The M^c Kee road is too steep, to haul up and its dangerous to haul

down. There was a house on my place when I went there already furnished. I saw the logs I spoke of on the McKee road last Monday, I think I had seen them before, James Oshall is hauling there and he leaves them on the road. I don't know when they will be taken out. I did not count the logs but I suppose there was a dozen across the road. The woods along the roads was full. The Evans road was full too. Ques: Don't you know that these logs are only left there temporarily by the hauler so that they would be more convenient to haul down the road in the snow?


Ans: I suppose it would be more convenient but I can't tell how long they will stay there. When Mr. Gill had the McKee road closed last winter with logs the Evans road was open. I don't know whether the difference between going from my place to Walter's mill by the McKee road or the Evans road would be more than a half mile or not. I have walked down the McKee road since Mr. Gill cleared. You can get down past McKee a good deal easier than you can get up. You could not haul a load up there; you could go down, but you could not go up. Levi Gates was supervisor last year before Mr. Arch. I demanded Mr. Gates to open the road in controversy

and work on it and he wouldn't do it. I might have threatened to prosecute him if he did not. Simon Paul is a son of Christopher Paul.

Re-examined by Mr. Evans.

I could not have hauled my boat down the McKee road it is too steep it would be dangerous. I have never hauled heavy loads down that road I have hauled a little grist down that road. I have hauled coal up along this road in controversy this fall. It aint very long ago. I had a little mule team. I hauled 25 bushel. It the same team I hauled my boat with. I hauled, I suppose, a cord or a cord and a half of boat. My team was too small to haul as much as the horse team. I bought every thing I have in my house from Winter. He went west and I bought his furniture in the house. In going to Flynn City by the Evans road you can go up past Hill's. but if the water is low you can cross the creek and its a little nearer I think. There is no bridge across the creek on the Evans road except at Mr. Hill's. Levi Gate is an uncle of Daniel Shays wife. Neither of the Mr. Pauls are any relation of mine that I know of. Mr. Parker is not a relation of mine.


