Paul Lehman being produced, sworn and examined on the part of the Petitioners for relief, doth depose and say: My name is Paul Lehman in am years of age, I was one of the men on a new & vacant part of a road near Mary's Mill in Carroll Twp. The ground for some distance where the change has been made has been laid out in building lots. I made a draft of these ^{lots} relating to the old road. The bridge at Mary's mill looks gone as if it would not last very long. The new road could be used to within about 10 or 12 rods of the bridge and then the old road could be used as long the bridge would last. I laid out other lots for the property holders near Mary's Mill some time last Spring. (Draft shown written) This draft correctly

shaws where the new and the old roads run through these lots. The names of the parties written on the lots are the names of the people who own them. I laid them out for some of them. I can see no difference in the ground of the old and new road. It lays along sides of it. It would not require any more filling than it has required on the old one. I think it would not require any more culverts. The one swamp is already drained, Mr. Mellon has dug a ditch across it and into the creek. That was the largest swamp on the road. Two houses have already been built on these lots. There is lumber hauled there for another. I don't know whether they have commenced building or not. I was not there very lately. Henry Mellon & Simon Torrey have already built there - Harris' stables. They built to the line of the proposed road. Part of the proposed road has already been graded by these parties. Draft identified by witnesses offered in evidence and marked "Exhibit A".

Mr. Scanlan objects to draft - diagram as not showing courses and distances of the proposed road, and road vacated and further it purports to be a town which is not of record and is apt to mislead parties from the original view.

Cross-examined by F.R. Scanlon Esq
I made "Exhibit A" about the beginning of May. I made it for Henry Mellon Simon Borden, Augustine Bunting

Samuel Kelley et al. The grade of the old road was nearly level excepting a short piece where Ecks land begins and a another near the bridge. The grade of the new road is near about the same of the old one. It was so near level I did not take the grade. It may be 4 or 5 degrees at the upper end. The vacated road is good and solid when there dry weather. The new road would pass over two swamps or ravines. I dont think it would be expensive to open the new road. The inhabitants of the Town generally would be benefited by the new road because its straighter, and those living on its ground would be greatly benefited as it would put their lots at right angles with the road. Simon Borden, Dr. Sloan, A.G. Turkey, Astorius Klein, Ed. Mellon, Gen. M'Kenzie, Henry Mellon Jr. Bennett, Saml. Kelly, A. Anna E. Charlina Dr. D.S. Rice, Emanuel Meutz would be benefited by the new road. Paul Short would be benefited to. The old road is not good enough considering except where it crosses the culverts and where the bridge is. Mellon, Borden & Short & others named above are residing on the ground now.

Henry Mellon (sworn)

I live in Carroll Town, near Mary Hill. I have lived there since last October. Paul Short owned the land around there, and jointly among

as we had it surveyed and laid out in
late. (Exhibit I show witness) I think that
this draft correctly represents the old and
new road, relatively to the lots, the turns
of the road, shown in red lines on the draft, are
not as sharp as represented I don't think.
They are more round. I was with the first
men on this road. The new road crosses
the old one about three different places
in that short distance. I don't just know
the distance. The new road might be about
50 ft away from the old one at the ~~farthest~~
place. Where the new road crosses the old one
there are several places where quite a distance
of the old one could be used. This is so now,
or so of the new road above our house grades
so that it would take very little work to make
it as good as the old one. There are four culverts
on the old road. These culverts are made now
of old rotten rail, old hemlock logs with
the knots on them, a few plank some places
they are in very bad shape. Two culverts is
all dead is necessary on the new road. The
new road is on a good ground for the pur-
pose of a road as the old one. It will make
a better road than the old one when traveled
on. There is one corner of the pier of the bridge
at May's Mill that is undermined and will
not stand another flood. It will be washed
down. The planks are about even out too.
If the new road is opened to the last point
where it crosses the old one next to the bridge.

cross Little Creek, they can still use the old bridge as long as it lasts. This last crossing is near about the line between Eck & Mary. To make this new road as good as the old one to the last crossing before the bridge would cost \$100. I am willing to fit a bond with security to do this work for \$100 - providing I have the use of the Twp. tool to work with. This last crossing is about 6 rods from the bridge. The 6 rods would be on the old road. It would be about ~~the~~ 10 rods. It is about 150 yards from my house to the last survey of the Chest Creek ^{R.R.} Mary's Grist mill or about 100 - or 150 yards from this last. The parker, ^{whose} name was ^{on} the draft ^{Exhibit A} has purchased lots there. Emanuel Hutz has bought five lots. His name is not on the draft. Portman & myself have built both half of the new road. Portay has lumber there to build. The old road was very crooked, winding round like a snake through the grass.

Examined by Mr. Scanlon,

The old road as marked on the ^{draft} road is a little sharper angled than the road itself I think. This has been about six surveys made for the Chest Creek R.R. in the last few years. I don't think that this old road was ever laid out by a surveyor as it runs now. It's 20 years since I first knew the old road. It may have been changed some since. If the new road is opened as laid out by the surveyors it will agree

new bridge over Little Chest. There are
four bridges across the Chest Creek now.
It will require one bridge across Little
Chest if the road is opened. The span of the
bridge would be about 16 feet. There are
two new houses built in this place, one
by myself and one by Tertan.

Re-cut arrived by Mr. Barker.

The stream on the old road already bridged
is not the Chest Creek but the Little Chest. It
was the same as the one with the four bridges
over it. It empties into the Chest Creek.
The road crossing one of the four bridges
has been washed. It is about 2 or 3 rods
between the old bridge and the place where the
new road crosses the stream. If the old bridge
were worth moving it could easily be moved
down. The late flood undermined the old
bridge to the center of the road bed, and it
was impassable until I went and repaired it.
It was not safe for horse or man to cross.
I filled this hole up with old logs & brush
and covered it with dirt, just a temporary
fix for the present time.

Mr. Scanlon objects as it does not designate

the roads in question.

Cross-examined by Mr Scanlan.

A bridge like the old one over Little Chest would not cost very much. It would only require filling up on one side. To build a bridge over Little Chest on the new road of new material would not cost over \$40.

Henry Mellon

Augustine Buckley. (sworn)

I own a couple of lots at Monkville. I propose to build a house there. I have the timber on the ground ready to build. I am a carpenter. It has been delayed in building on account of the road proceedings. There may be a delay in building to the new road. I would have to build on the bed of the old one. Vinton Reig a supervisor told me he had no objection to me going on and grading the new road and straightening it up. He said I could build up to the new road when I got it graded up past my place. I wanted to build on last next cross street as shown on draft. I did grade part of the way. I waited the season first to late to grading of the new road and make it as good as the old one for \$100.

Cross-examined by Mr Scanlan

I purchased from Paul Short. I bought some last fall or spring this spring after it was laid out. The first I bought before either the town or road was laid out. The

last after. Paul Short owned the land on which this house was laid out. Paul Short had part of it laid out in lots & he had part of it. This conversation between R. & me was in Cornwalltown. He says he had no objection how much I graded. He did not hire or pay me for the grading. Re-examines by Mr. Barker.

He gave me permission to set my house on the old road after I had graded the new one. He offered me the loan if the Twp. scoops & tools.

R. cross-examined Mr. Scanlon.

He was not joking - that I know of I was in earnest. He did not ask me if I had bought the Twp. road, he did not tell me that if I built my house in the Twp. road and he came along he would plough it down. He did not tell me that he had not obtained my consent to grant me permission to build on Twp. road.

Augustine Buckley

Acknowledged. (Signed)

I own some lots at Mark Mill. I intended to build on them. I was over the road and saw where others had been doing grading down on the new road. The grading was done in front of my lot between mine & Buckley's. To open the new road and make it as good as the old one - exclusive of the bridge wanted cost about \$100.

The new road is the whole length of Mr. Short's land I suppose something over 100 rods. It does not cost would cost off a corner of Oxburgo lot if Short has not bought it. I think the upper end of the new road runs through woods. I don't think it would cost less alone to open that part of it.


Samuel Kelly (sworn)



I own lots there on which I intend to build houses examined by Mr. Scanlan.

I was over this road 20 or 30 years ago. I don't think that the crookedness of the road was caused by getting around swamps.


