

NOTE.—“It shall be the duty of all persons appointed in the several counties of this Commonwealth to view and review any public or private road or bridge, if they shall decide in favor of locating said road or bridge, to endeavor to procure from the persons over whose land such location may be made releases from all claims for damages that might arise from the opening of such road or the building of such bridge; and in every case where said viewers shall fail to procure such releases, and it shall appear to them that any damages will be sustained, it shall be their duty to assess the damages and make report thereof signed by a majority of their number, and return the same, together with all releases obtained, to the Court of Quarter Sessions, and the damages so assessed shall be conclusive, or may be subject to appeal, review or modification, as may be provided by existing laws in the different counties of this Commonwealth.”

“The persons appointed as aforesaid shall view such ground, and if they shall agree that there is occasion for a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance, and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the petitioners.”

“The viewers, as aforesaid, shall make report, at the next term of said Court, and in the said report shall state particularly: first, who of them were present at the view; second, whether they were severally sworn or affirmed; third, whether the road desired be necessary for a public or private road; they shall also annex and return to the Court a plot or draft thereof, stating the courses and distances, and noting briefly the improvements, through which it may pass; and whenever practicable, the viewers shall lay out the said roads at an elevation not exceeding five degrees, (except at the crossing of ravines and streams) where, by moderate filling and bridging, the declination of the road may be preserved within that limit.”

Daniel Rager been produced and  
first duly sworn testified as  
follows . . .

I live in West Taylor Township

am Seventy three year old and  
am of a man by occupation, I am  
familiar with the <sup>proposed</sup> Road leading from  
Bowers Blairstown shop to the  
House of Michael Mc Mahon in  
West Taylor Township... After the  
proposed Road passes through my land  
it goes through a great part of Rocky  
Country and then strikes the  
hill. There is not a bit of necessity  
for this proposed Road. The  
Road is supposed to be Two miles  
and three quarters long. The Road  
would accommodate not more  
than four persons at the upper end,  
<sup>persons</sup> there is open at the lower end that  
would use it if the Road was put  
on the Road they now use... for a  
few hundred yards. All the per-  
sons living along the proposed  
Road now have outlets to the  
Main Road. To the best of my  
Knowledge if the proposed Road  
was made in many places it  
would be over five degrees.  
The Road to be made as a Town-  
ship Road should be made it  
would cost nearly or altogether

Two Thousand Dollars. Why because  
the Township Roads that are made  
are not made passable they are too  
narrow in many places ~~they~~ you  
can't pass any way half decent.  
They can make a road that you  
can drive along but it is not  
a Township Road. The ground  
is very rough and stony, one half  
of it ~~is~~ <sup>is</sup> nothing all rocks. Some of  
these rocks would have to be  
blasted out undoubtedly, There  
are some persons along the line that  
pretend by farm there less Berke-  
field. Bent Ribblett, George Ribblett,  
Ebenezer Cardy, believe on the  
lower except George Ribblett he  
lives opposite Dr. Wm. H. Henn &  
I speak of the lower end of mean  
the town towards the Township  
Road that is now made sup-  
pose it is a quarter of a mile the  
way the road runs from ~~high~~

Main Road. Sometimes they  
go down along the line of the pro-  
posed Road and make business  
where they have stores.

### Cross Examined.

I am the father in law of George  
Ribblett one of the Petitioners for  
this proposed Road, they say so.  
I have nothing particular against  
George over they are not using  
the right, because it is contrary  
to the bargain him and I made.  
The line of the proposed road runs  
through my farm they want  
to cut one right in two, I have ten  
or fifteen up above the line of the  
proposed Road if it takes fifteen  
Acres above I will have One hun-  
dred and five acres below the  
Road, I run from one line  
to the other It runs slitter on the  
catacorner like. It runs about

One hundred and twenty rods through  
grayland, I have objections to the  
Road ~~as~~ if it did not run through  
the the Road is of rollers. The upper  
end is now labor for the persons  
that would use it. I consider  
the road they now is nigher, the  
road as now proposed would be on  
the old Road they now use, in  
a manner. The Road they now  
use is not a Township Road the  
proposed road come down along  
it for about a quarter of a mile, &  
I, Then this old Road that these  
people along the lower end of this  
proposed Road <sup>use</sup> you desire to  
close according to our bargain  
with Mr George Ribblett.)

A. Yes the bargain <sup>is</sup> between  
George Ribblett and me, that the line  
is to be the lane and the ~~Road~~ to  
Road to divide us.

I, Mr Rager there has already  
done travel over the line of the  
proposed Road before the Road  
is laid out.

A. Well of course there is some  
people travels it through the Woods

and On the Road and every place.  
I have said that many places along  
the proposed road it would be  
over five degrees. reason would  
teach Method by seeing the hills  
along it., A degree is showing  
his hands at angle and laying  
them over one another is the way  
until you get up. The most of  
Township Roads are too narrow  
and are not built properly, I think  
there is money enough spent on the roads  
but they are not made good, It  
will cost \$200<sup>00</sup> to make this road  
as a Township Road ought to be  
made. A Township Road ought  
to be made wide enough to let  
pass and repass. a good many  
of our Township Roads you can't  
pass. It will take at least Collec-  
tion from fifteen hundred to seven  
teen hundred dollars to make this  
Road like an other Township  
Roads and they are not made at  
all. The road does there people  
have an outlet to is the Town-  
ship Road, It is just a mid-  
dling Road where they proposed

Road commences at the lower end  
on the Township Road. It was an  
old charcoal Road and the Road  
where they went up <sup>to</sup> ~~the town~~  
~~Charcoal Roads~~. At Mr. Mathews  
was an old charcoal Road.

There is no person trying to shut  
these people at the lower end off  
from the Township Road, so  
but not as I know of.

bargain is. Daniel Rader

Jonas F. Goughman Affirmed.

My name is Jonas F. Goughman.  
My age 59 past. My occupation  
farmer. Reside in West Taylor  
Township. I am to some certain  
extent familiar with the line of  
the proposed Road from Bowles  
Blacksmith Shop to Mr. Mathews  
house. And have been over it  
several times. There is not  
very much necessity for this

proposed road. This proposed road would pass in the neighborhood of about half dozen of farms and small lots. These are principally situated at the lower end of the road. There are now within about a hundred and fifty Rods of the Township Road as now existing. This Road would not accommodate more than from one to three farm carts. One hundred and fifty Rods from the lower Township Road, there persons are George Rabbett, and perhaps Isaac Bowser somewhat, and that fills the bill. There will be reached the Township Road by private Roads alternately crossing the proposed new road. George Rabbett and Isaac Bowser would use this proposed new road for a distance of from half to three quarters of a mile down to the present Township Rd. I don't know any body that would use the road above them, practically for two miles this proposed road would not be used by any body. As to

giving them an outlet at the upper end of the Road, The character of the ground is very rough rocky and went ravines over what the road would pass. The upper end is somewhat smoother, but steep in places. The grade of the road varies but the steepest places ~~would run from six~~ to eight degrees. The road would be pretty expensive to make. In my view of the matter it would cost from fifteen to sixteen hundred dollars to make a thoroughfare road. There are some big rocks on the way.

### Cross examination

I live on what is termed Bishop's hill about the middle of the Township. About a mile and half from the lower end of the proposed Road, I have no particular interest in this road but think the Road is uncalculated. There is one or two persons that live near the line of the road whose farms do not touch this road. that the road would be a great convenience to go about one hundred rods at the lower end.

I think it would be no benefit or accommodation to Mahon, Dwyer, and Benson, because the town lie within Twenty five Rods of an established Township Road.

2. If the entire line of this proposed Road was closed up, would all the parties having property the same have an outlet.)

Ans. No Sir, for the simple reason that this proposed road runs along their private Road part of the way, The character of the ground ~~is~~ is rough and one of the roughest routes ever undertaken in land out in West Taylor.

3. Is this Road that is proposed to be built any rougher and rockier and more ravines than ~~the~~ other Township Roads built for the same distance,

4. It is rougher but that there are not as many ravines to be crossed.

If this proposed <sup>Road</sup> does not go along side of a ravine in George Rabbetts ground, it would not cost quite so much to build this road, perhaps from Twenty five to thirty dollars less.

James Eckels Sworn

My age is 52 years. My residence West Taylor Township my occupation Laborer. I am familiar with the route of this proposed road from Bowers Blacksmith Shop. I have been over the ground & do not think there is any necessity for building the Road for the accomodation of the public. There is only about six farms and lots that their land adjoins the proposed Road. They live principally on the lower end next Bowers Shop.

Q. State who the persons are who live along the line of the proposed Road and how far they are distant from the present Township Road on which Bowers Blacksmith Shop is now located.

A. The first is Benjamin Rabbett about Twenty-five Rods., Ebenezer Crandall about One hundred Rods.; Jesse Berkely about One hundred and fifty Rods. then come on George Rager and Daniel Rager another hundred and fifty rods. and from them up it would not be where it intersects the

the Mr. Wm. Wogahon Road it would run  
through unseated land owned  
by Wright to the corner of  
Benshoop Land of which I do  
not own. Isaac Bowers Wright  
use this Road but as the same  
time he has asked ~~permitted~~ it.  
These parties below all have out-  
lets to the Township Road without  
building the proposed road, all  
use the one road. I have gone  
over the route of the proposed road  
with the view of making an estimate  
of what it would cost to make it.  
The ground is very rough. There  
would be side cutting and fills  
and rocks to be removed by  
powder or dynamite, & don't  
understand the degrees but from  
what I can understand about  
it the road would run over four  
degrees. The road or portions of it  
would be very steep.  
2. The road would stop at the top  
of the mountain intersecting a  
Road Grade last year at or near  
Michael Wogahon's house. the  
proposed Road Commissioner of the

foot of the Mountain and its general direction is up until it reaches the top. When I went over the road I went about what I thought would be a hundred rods and sometimes two hundred rods and made a calculation by sections, and marked it down each section as I went along. And I made the cost of the Road Nineteen hundred and fifty Dollars (\$1750<sup>00</sup>). If the road was made it would be hard to keep it in repair all down grade it would wash badly.

#### Cross Examined.

I live in West end of the Township on the Road that the proposed Road starts from. a mile this way. This proposed road would be of no benefit to me that I know of. I have <sup>no</sup> particularly bad feeling toward Mr Rabbelt or any of these Petitioners or any person else that I know of.

My objection to this road is not out of any spite I have for Mr Rabbelt but because of meander-

I am 29 yrs of age Teamster by

I have been over the road and am somewhat familiar with the proposed road leading from Bowser to McMahan's. It is a rough country through which this road passes full of Rocky and Ravines. It would not be easy to make a road over this route, there are Rocks there that would have to be blasted out. The grade would be pretty steep. In my judgment it would cost from sixteen to seventeen hundred dollars to make the Road. For the upper two miles of the Road it does not pass through any cleared land. People living down at the lower end of the proposed <sup>Road</sup> have outlets by private Roads to the Township Road at Bowser's Shop. The majority of them live within two hundred Rods of the Township Road at Bowser's Shop. From my knowledge of that County I don't think there is any necessity for the proposed road from Bowser's Shop to the top of the Mountain. It would be a hard Road to keep up. It would be hilly.

Cross Examined

I live just below Coopersdale  
near Cambria Furnace, about  
a mile and a half from the  
lower part of the Road, I never  
built a road. I have some ideas  
in regard to the cost of building  
a Road. I say it would cost  
over sixteen hundred dollars, be-  
cause it is a hill from one end  
to the other for one thing, and  
Rocks and Ravines to cross.  
Over I made an estimate of what  
it would cost to build the Road.  
This Road would be an accom-  
modation for people living along



dred yards of the proposed road &

land and mine & amalgamates  
with the proposed route of this

some rocks on it, and some  
rocks on the bed of the road and  
one hill that will take some  
grading. I believe to the best of  
my judgment that there could

Mr Berkelye has lived some twelve  
or fourteen years where he now  
lives, perhaps longer, I can't  
tell you how long the road he  
uses has been use. I never to  
knew of it being closed no-  
body ever shut them up.

I said that it would be an ad-  
vantage to Monahan to have the

A. It will be this advantage to them it will be an easier Road than the one they are using now for the Road that they are using now is not fit to travel on with teams.

D. What team travel from your Settlement up the Mountain

A. Mr. Jesse Baskerville and his son Rabbett team have up the Mountain, Mr. Rabbett has wood down and lumber up.

I have seen him several times at George Rabbett's.

There is no particular travel from Mirokow down except what I said of Mirokow to reach the Saw Mill, and Benshoof and McMullen.

D. Does the proposed Road touch Benshoof or McMullen.

A. They could reach it without going back or over.

They have new roads break the Township road and would have to make new roads to intersect this new proposed Road.

The Road I propose to build for  
Seven hundred and fifty dollars  
would be single track and  
passable. I am not scholar  
enough to figure up the cubic  
yards of excavation or filling.  
I suppose at the deepest place  
there would not be over five  
feet for the cutting and this  
for a short distance, I could  
not tell you how many cubes  
yards of filling there is only two  
places I remember that would  
take any filling of any account.  
In the first place when I passed over  
the road I took other or another  
to see how near it was to the level  
on which I was standing. Or how  
much higher it was I got  
my measurement for my grade

Issue Berkspire affirmed.

I reside in West Taylor Township  
Age 52 yrs. occupation farmer. I  
am familiar with this proposed  
Road from Bassers Blockhouse  
Shop to my neighbors in West Taylor  
Township. I passed over the  
Road recently, was along when  
they Surveyed it and helped carry  
the Chain. I have property along  
the line of the proposed road. I  
am nearly adjacent the road it  
runs below the house and  
barn. This road is necessary  
to me and is necessary to the  
rest of the people in that Town  
Munity.

D. Stole whether or not that  
there are property holders along  
the <sup>entire</sup> line of the proposed roads  
that this road is necessary to.

E. Objected to reading  
A. I believe there is.

There is about one or two families  
right along the line that this

Road would benefit, there are  
other off of it.  
I believe the road would be of  
benefit to persons living at the  
upper end of the road. I think  
the road could be built for Seven  
hundred and fifty or eight hun-  
dred dollars, single track so a  
person could drive it. Well  
according to my judgment of  
the road was built for Seven  
hundred and fifty or eight hun-  
dred dollars as I estimate and  
in the way I state it would  
compare with some of the other  
roads we've got made, and  
wouldn't be any worse. It would  
be much like any of the hill roads  
to keep in repair. The nature of  
the ground is rough rocky and  
Spring runs. Coal run crosses  
it at one place. The upper end  
is not rocky there are some stone  
but they are small. and there are  
no spring runs at the end of  
it. There are some of the rocks would  
have to be blasted but I don't  
think it would be very expensive.

is not over five degrees except

A. It would cost Sixteen or  
seventeen hundred Dollars I  
believe a pretty decent road  
could be made for that money

Made a kind of a calculation of  
the excavation and filling. Our  
Township Roads are pretty good  
muddling roads some of them  
have washed badly. The road  
I refer to is the old Columbia Furnace  
Road, I did not come down that  
fine as to take yards of excavation  
on the Road to make this single  
track Road nor did I particularly  
take the number of cubic yard  
of filling. and I don't know  
what the filling required would  
cost. All the Rocks that are visible  
would not cost ten dollars to  
put them out of the Road. I did  
not count all the rocks that  
are visible and in the road  
that would have to be blasted,  
I could not just tell you what  
it would cost to break up the  
stone that a wagon may  
pass along the road. I could  
not tell you exactly how much it  
would cost to make ditches for  
the Spring run that crosses  
the road. There is not more  
than five or six of that many.

It would not cost more than Twenty or Twenty five Dollars to cut down the timber along the nose of the road, At the Ridge Road for about Two Hundred Rods the grade of the Road would be over five degrees & don't know how much over. The road would be liable to wash as other township Roads are. Shepherds living on the lower end could be accommodated if this Road was made as far as George Rabbatts.

From George Rabbatts up the road runs through unseated land clear to the top of the mountain, and this part is the longest and steepest part of the road there is not much difference but in my judgment this is the longest land.

Morganon has a township road down past Bruce Griffitts to Johnstown.

I have an out let to the Township Road along this proposed Road and I don't know whether it is twenty or twenty one years since I moved there and I have always used part of it, there

Road was there when I went  
there & changed it down to my  
own land. Jonathan Eakels  
Eckardt, and Isaac Bowers  
also use this same Road as  
does Benj Ribblett, not so far  
as I do. John Berghoff and  
Arthur Grindell also use this  
Road when they come down  
this way. Jonathan Eakels has  
been using this road for fifteen years  
perhaps longer. I can't tell positively.  
George Ribblett has used ever since  
he lived up there I can't say  
how long. and Isaac Bowers  
off and on ever since he lived  
up there. The Road is cleared  
pretty well down from George  
Ribblett's farm up to it is  
not cleared. Daniel Rayer  
uses it when he goes to church and  
fazier Meeting. From my place  
down there is fence along the  
Road to the Township Road.  
It is fenced up through Rayer's  
ground but not after that.

Every body travels along this  
road that wants to but Mrs

Mr Daniel Rager kicked last fall  
about using the Road up through  
his place he lives above me,  
and a little below Geo Ribblett.  
Rager goes straight down to the  
water dam, George Ribblett

old Road until it comes to  
Rager's place except for about  
ten rods as near as I can tell.  
This road has been fenced  
up on either side except at

I am acquainted with part of this  
proposed road from Bowser to  
McMahon's I live in West Taylor  
Township about a half mile  
and two hundred yards due a  
half mile from the beginning  
of the Road. This Road can  
never be a Public Road, I think  
this proposed is very necessary  
to have there, they is a road  
there and has been as far as  
Berkeley for fifty one years.  
as far as I know and have heard  
up as far as George Ribblett along

ground. Some places the Road

miles and a half or little over.

I. Taking into consideration all  
the necessary excavations and  
the filling in of the ravines the  
removal of the rock and the  
damage of the springs and  
the grading down to five  
degrees what would be the  
cost to make a single track  
road passable.

J. It could be done for seven  
hundred and fifty Dollars or  
eight hundred Dollars

I really think that the pro-  
posed Road is necessary to  
the Community there. It is  
necessary at the upper end.  
The people living along there  
now have outlets but they are  
poor ones. Those having nearest  
to the Township Road have the  
best. These outlets from the  
upper part are through private  
property. Some of them outlets are  
through uninclosed timber  
lands. There are no <sup>any</sup> inclosed  
timber land between where the  
Road commences and Burke  
fles. The principal part of the

old Road that has been used along  
the line of the proposed Road  
between Berkspile and George  
Ribblets is through enclosed  
woodland

Cross Examined <sup>Ques</sup>  
Q. You say that there is no  
necessity for more than a single  
track along the proposed Road.

A. Yes Sir

Q. Then you would not com-  
pel much travel along the  
Road.

A. No there would not be so  
much travel along the Road.

Q. You and Mr. Bandjo & Mr.  
Berkspile use the same Road  
down the Township Road.

A. Yes Sir and other  
parties above us come into  
the same Road yes Sir  
any body that wishes travels  
that Road. It is the same  
Road that Mr. Ribblet testifies has  
been open for fifty one years.  
Mr. Berkspile changed it a little  
at the lower end. All persons  
that I speak of now access to

the Township Roads by means  
of this old head. I have not  
made any calculation of the  
cubic yards necessary to cava-  
tion to make this a straight  
Road up to my house, nor  
have I made a calculation  
of the running Cubic yards  
of fill required. I made  
calculation of the Rocks that  
would have to be blasted to  
get them out of the way of the  
Road. A ten dollar bill would  
get away them. I can tell  
you exactly how many there  
are, but there are five or six  
of them. I couldn't tell how  
much drilling best I would  
oblige myself to drill and  
put them out of the way for  
ten dollars. I could not state  
how much time it would  
take to take away the stone  
after blasting but ten dollars  
will do all the work. I did  
not make any calculation how  
much it would take to break  
up the stone some places

There would be a good deal of  
Stone breaking at other places. Not  
so much the roadway pretty  
smooth, I have not made  
any calculation of the cost of  
any necessary Culverts over  
the runs. There is one or  
two of any consequence

I am laborer by occupation, age  
35 yrs. Reside in West Taylor  
and own property, and I live  
about from a quarter to a half  
mile from the proposed Road.  
I think that this road would  
be necessary to people living  
along this line, and those keep  
bothering, I use this Road in  
going to Sunday School and  
Church, nobody ever has died  
or promising this road when  
ever I wanted to, The Road  
in its present condition is  
rough.

Reside in West Taylor age 36

occupations farmer, I live along the  
line of this proposed road, and  
am familiar with it. I was  
along and carried the chain,  
when the road was surveyed.  
I took notes and figure up  
there. We have no double track  
roads clear through double  
track, in our Township, and  
I think this road could be built  
for six hundred and fifty or  
seven hundred dollars. And  
a good passable road single  
track Road of it, for seven  
hundred dollars at the most  
I mean the whole road could  
be completed with single  
track and passable including  
all the work necessary to be  
done and I really think  
that this road is necessary to  
accommodate the Commu-  
nity in which I live, and  
when I say Community I  
mean the people who live along  
and near the line of the pro-  
posed Road, I suppose the  
Road could be finished at a

grade of five degrees, except at  
the upper end, where we lay it  
on the ~~old~~ Ridge Road to save  
expenses, and the Road along  
there is good solid gravelly.  
The road at this particular  
point could be graded down  
to five degrees or under, we  
have very bad dirt lots to the  
Township Road very rough  
and steep carts have more  
than half a load up the hill  
I think & anyone bold and  
well furnish this proposed Road  
as a good single track Road  
for Seven hundred dollars  
The witness now volunteers a  
Statement: The witness, composes  
deposes the statement made me  
assayt & not made.

Cross Examined,  
I am the principal author in  
getting out the petition for this  
road. I have just made a  
lump job of it and have no  
calculation of the cost of the  
Road. I say that the Road is a  
five degree road and I don't think

the Dishong Road is more than  
that. I don't know exactly what  
aginc Dopee Road is. The people  
principally interested, near the  
half of them, live between or near  
this road between where it com-  
mences and my place, & we'll  
use the Burkpile Road.
