Paul Gahner being produced, sworn and examined on the part of the Plaintiff & Ex. doth depose and say:

My name is Paul Gahner, I am years of age, I was one of the reviewers to review a road from a point near Christophel's in Whit Twp to Beaver Valley Sch. House,

Quee-Paper endorsed - No 5 June 1889 R.R. I have been witness and he is asked to state whether or not the report of the reviewer is correct or not; whether or not the same has an accompanying draft showing the old road as well as the parts sought to be supplied.

Ans - Yes, The review was made on the 21 Feb 1890, I passed over that part of the old road sought to be supplied by the recd. I passed over the parts supplied by the reviewer in their report, The supplies part in the report

opposite begins at a point on drift
marked "P. Flynn" and ends near Haltis
Mills. The old road from South P. Flynn
back to it intersects the road leading
past Haltis Mills is on level ground
through a bottom. At the time the road
was laid it was in a passable condition
I did not see much wrong with it, I
guess it could compare pretty favorably
with other Irish roads. There are some better
and I guess some worse than it was.
I think there are no streams of water cross-
ing the old road between these two points,
unless it might be a small spring I don't
remember noticing any. I think we
kept on the south side of the river. Be-
tween the points mentioned the old road
passes through some cleared land when
it goes into the Coalport road - a
field or two small fields. I think only
one field. A man by the name of Strayce
owns the cleared land: it goes through
so I was told. This was at the time we
were there Gates or bars across the end of
the old road where it enters the road
past Haltis mill and, at the other end
of its improvement, I think Mr. James
Lalor shaved me where the supplies
began by the river commenced and
then we struck the marks of the survey-
or. We struck what they said was Strayce's
line and then we followed it up to
McKee's Blacksmith Shop. This is

one considerable little stream near
where the part supplied commences. At
these there is at least one considerable ra-
vines, with a spring run, farther on.
It would be necessary to build a bridge
or bridges across those streams or ravines.
The first run is in quite a flat place and
there are no banks, then comes some stone
abutments raised up on each side and
approaches one on each side, I could
not tell how long the bridge would have
to be. The remaining portion of the supplied
part goes through woods until you get
out to Strayer's field, the ground is quite
irregular and broken in places, there is one
quite a deep ravine through it; somewhat
up grade going out towards the Coast, i.e.
woods, McKeer Blacksmith Shop which
is at first; then a part of it is comparatively
level, When it comes out between a
short distance of the main road, it pitches
down quite a heavy grade until it en-
ters said road, I mean by main road
the one that passes Walter's Mill. I took
the degrees of elevation on the supplied part
from the main road up to the top of the
hill nearest to the road. I made it
out (8°) Eight degrees. If it could be
made over the supplied part as this is

new over the old road. I would say that
of one half or one third of the money re-
quired to open that new road was ex-
pended on the old road it would make
a far better road, than ever can be made
out of the new road the new part, on
account of the steep grade of said part
Cross examined by Mr. F. A. Haeneker

The part marked "supplied part" or draft of re-
ceivs divides the Shryer and Hutton farms.
The vacated part runs through the Shryer
farm; that is from the dotted line to the
main road. The poor road marked "sup-
plied" part caused all the hard injury
to private property - that is to Mr. Shryer
I think one of the reasons I spoke of in the
supplied part is on Mr. Shryer's land.
They are in the wooded part near mid-
way between the two farms, the part
marked vacated passes over batture
ground, but I did not make any
swamp. There are no ravines on the vacated
part that I recollect of. He measured
5 rods from the point where the vacated
part shifts the main road to the point
where the supplied part enters it.

Re-examined.

Mr. Schoolman stands between the church
and the point where the old road enters the
main road past Hutton Mill. I do not

~~Know that it would in general be
cheaper that the old road would be
more convenient to the traveling public
than the parts supplied.~~

Re-Cross-examined

That is what they call the ridge road running between Christ Church and the School House.

Re-examined -

For James Gallagher to get on to Ridge Road he would ~~walk~~ have to go up the present road to Christ Church, a distance of about a mile away from home in a contrary direction, and then he would have to go back about a quarter of a mile before he would get to the ridge road. Then he would go down the ridge road about two miles to the church near the Old House on the main road. By the present public's road down past Tracy's to the church would be a little over a mile. There is another road for Gallagher to get on the ridge road except what I have given. This is a hill that a horse cannot hardly climb up between Gallagher's house and ridge road.

Perry Palmer

James Oshall (affirmed)
I live in white Fox Canfield Co. I know the location of the road from Christ Church to

David Hayes, His following families live
along the road - Mr Baker, James Gallagher
John Pennington and myself. These parties
all live above the part of the road sought
to be supplied. It is the road these people
are to go the Mill, church, Flynn City and
to school, They haul lumber and back
when they have it down that way. The
part of the road sought to be vacated is
a pretty good road. It is about level.
I was over the part of the road sought
to be supplied yesterday. I caught it
was pretty rough ground. It is hilly
back ways, It is hill going toward the
Mill and hill going up the other way.
I don't think it would be to the advantage
of the hunting public to change the old
road to the part supplied. The hill next
to Mill has on the supplied part is pretty
steep the other is a middle sized
grade. The supplied part passes over some
streams. It would require the building of
bridges or footways. It would require two
any how. There is one spring near cross-
ing the old road. It is bridged over.
The old road is pretty near as good as the
other foot roads in the town. It is as
good as some. I would not like to
open up the new road for \$500. To
make the old road a good road would

not take more than a third of that. I don't think that the new road could do nearly as good as the old one - on account of the hills.

Witness H. K. Major - James ^{his} O' Hallor ^{Court}

James M. Gallagher (Divorced)


I live in White Fish Cabin Co. I know the road from Chet. Halls down to Daniel Hayes. It passes by my place. Besides myself James O'Hallor Mrs. Baker & John Pennington live along that road. It is the road we used to go to school, church mill & Flynn City - I have been over the part of the road sought to be supplied. I was present when the need was made. I pointed out to Dr. Gaber the place where the miners have located the road. The old road is about as good as the rest of the Fish road taking all of them. The old road from my place down to Chet. Halls as a nearly level road. It would be down grade from my place to Mr. Hayes. It would be slight I don't think any place over three degrees. I think the old road could be made a good road. There is no stream crossing the old road on the part to be vacated except one small spring run. This is bridged over. The new road is pretty rough ground. It

crosses one middling long run, close
to the beginning, on sharper end, and
one ravine about one half way, from
then to Shayer's field as near as I can
guess. It would be necessary to
bridge the streams & ravines. The new
road is hilly both ways. The hill next
our place is not very steep - deflected
to be about 4°. The hill at Mr. Tees black
smith shop coming from Walter's mill to
ours our place is very steep. It would
be impossible on each of the hill to make
as good a road along the new road
as along the old. This is the same road
as the one sought to be vacated some
time ago, that is the whole of it. A
new re-vac was made at that time.
The road was not vacated, it is known that
the proceedings were had to vacate the whole
road. Daniel Shayer had gatesways at
the end of his improved land and also
at the end of the road where it enters the
road past Walter's mill, and he has
yet, after the decree was made refusing
to vacate the whole of the road, I went to
Daniel Shayer and asked ^{him to} remove the
gates. He said he would but that he
wanted some time to make the fence. He
never made the fence.

Cross examined -

I have been taking an active part in
opposing this road, I do not like to be
shut up. James W. Gallagher

Mr. Evans offers no evidence Report of





In this case we have before us a report of viewers reporting a vacation and supply of a certain road in White Township; we also have a report of re-viewers adverse to the report of viewers; we have testimony taken in support of the report of viewers, and also testimony in support of report of the re-viewers; we also have in testimony proceedings had at No. 4 of March Sessions 1887, and the opinion of the Court thereon in reference to the vacation of said road.

After carefully considering all these circumstances, First : that there was a report of viewers viewing, laying out and returning as a public road the road now under consideration; that an order issued to the supervisors for the opening thereof; that an attempt to vacate it was successfully opposed at said No. 4 March Sessions 1887, and that now we have a report of viewers in favor of a vacation in supply; and a report of the re-viewers against a vacation in supply, and testimony about in equilibrio, we refuse to confirm the report of viewers vacating and supplying the road. And that the proceedings herein had so far as the same relates to the petition to vacate and supply, are dismissed. And that the petitioners are directed to pay the costs of the Clerk of the Court to the Quarter Sessions, and as well as the fee for taking depositions in this proceeding.

NOTE.—"It shall be the duty of all persons appointed in the several counties of this Commonwealth to view and review any public or private road or bridge, if they shall decide in favor of locating said road or bridge, to endeavor to procure from the persons over whose land such location may be made releases from all claims for damages that might arise from the opening of such road or the building of such bridge; and in every case where said viewers shall fail to procure such releases, and it shall appear to them that any damages will be sustained, it shall be their duty to assess the damages and make report thereof signed by a majority of their number, and return the same, together with all releases obtained, to the Court of Quarter Sessions, and the damages so assessed shall be conclusive, or may be subject to appeal, review or modification, as may be provided by existing laws in the different counties of this Commonwealth."

"The persons appointed as aforesaid shall view such ground, and if they shall agree that there is occasion for a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance, and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the petitioners."

"The viewers, as aforesaid, shall make report, at the next term of said Court, and in the said report shall state particularly: first, who of them were present at the view; second, whether they were severally sworn or affirmed; third, whether the road desired be necessary for a public or private road; they shall also annex and return to the Court a plot or draft thereof, stating the courses and distances, and noting briefly the improvements through which it may pass: and, whenever practicable, the viewers shall lay out the said roads at an elevation not exceeding five degrees (except at the crossing of ravines and streams), where, by moderate filling and bridging, the declination of the road may be preserved within that limit."





NOTE.—"It shall be the duty of all persons appointed in the several counties of this Commonwealth to view and review any public or private road or bridge, if they shall decide in favor of locating said road or bridge, to endeavor to procure from the persons over whose land such location may be made releases from all claims for damages that might arise from the opening of such road or the building of such bridge; and in every case where said viewers shall fail to procure such releases, and it shall appear to them that any damages will be sustained, it shall be their duty to assess the damages and make report thereof signed by a majority of their number, and return the same, together with all releases obtained, to the Court of Quarter Sessions, and the damages so assessed shall be conclusive, or may be subject to appeal, review or modification, as may be provided by existing laws in the different counties of this Commonwealth."

"The persons appointed as aforesaid shall view such ground, and if they shall agree that there is occasion for a road, they shall proceed to lay out the same, having respect to the shortest distance, and the best ground for a road, and in such manner as shall do the least injury to private property, and also be, as far as practicable, agreeable to the desire of the petitioners."

"The viewers, as aforesaid, shall make report, at the next term of said Court, and in the said report shall state particularly: first, who of them were present at the views; second, whether they were severally sworn or affirmed; third, whether the road desired be necessary for a public or private road; they shall also annex and return to the Court a plot or draft thereof, stating the courses and distances, and noting briefly the improvements through which it may pass; and, whenever practicable, the viewers shall lay out the said roads at an elevation not exceeding five degrees (except at the crossing of ravines and streams), where, by moderate filling and bridging, the declination of the road may be preserved within that limit."

Henry Taulau being produced, sworn and examined on the part of the Vice doth depose and say:

My name is Henry Taulau, am years of age; I was one of the men who made & supply a road from Christ Hall to Beaver Valley School House in White Lick, I think I was a man on this same road some twenty odd years ago. I know the character of the ground between the Stayner & Meltzer place over which the road supplied runs, The character of the ground is good, I would consider that the ground between the Stayner & Meltzer farms better ground for a road than when the road now is. The path supplied could not ascend three degrees at any place except perhaps at the run where it connects and at the main road where it connects, I did not grade the road. I think

a little reasonable cutting just at one point
just where it connects with the main road
it could be kept at fine degrees.

Ques = ~~What~~ ^{speaking} in your opinion the farm of Mrs.
Strayer is damaged much more by the road
as originally located than by the road along
the division line between the two farms?

Mr. Evans objects to the question as irrelevant
and immaterial.

Ans = I would not consider it any damage
on the line between the two farms because Geo
Walters in this life time when I ran off lots
there left a piece of ground there for a road.
The distance the ~~the~~ road runs through Mrs.
Strayer's land I can not tell, but in its
zig-zagging through her farm I would estimate
the damages for fencing over \$200.
If it were my farm I would not have it
in there and keep the fence up for that.
The vacated part of the road is on the flat
in the bottom. The supplies have always been
the shortest distance from Thirst stacks to Mill
Flynn & City &c, I can't tell how much.
I only recollect Mr. Gallagher said, as being a-

You can approximately get the elevation
by the compass.

Henry Snelson
John Pickett - (affirmed)

I am familiar with the road as shown on
the draft of Re-measure from McKees - up over
the division line and from the main road
up over the old road.

Ques = What is your opinion would be the
compasses injury or damage to the farm of
Mrs. Shryner by the one on road marked
"vacated part" or the other marked "supplied
part".

Mr. Evans objects for the reason that it is irrelevant and immaterial to question of damages is not a small or considerable sum. Ans: If it was my case I would not keep up the fence and have the road personally located on the vacated part for \$500. The character of the ground along the supplied part varies; part of it naturally dry land and part of it wet or swampy. The character of the ground along the vacated part is mostly all low ground. As regards ballast to the vacated part would have to be furnished from road. I could not say which would cost the most to make, the vacated or supplied. One ~~it~~^{is} cut out - or partly - and the other aint. I was one of the men appointed to meet weekly the road, Jas. M. Gallagher & Mr. G. Fleming were both along when the received it. They both opposed the location of the road as supplied.

Ques: State whether or not you met Mr. Fleming afterward and what conversation you had with him?

Mr. Evans Objects to the testimony for the reason that it is incompetent irrelevant and ministerial,

Ans: I met him near Coalport after the meeting. He seemed to be displeased with the new or returned. He claimed it would cost to more to build a road on the new line than on the old. He said it would cost in

a law suit. I know that Mr. Fleming was supervisor of which town in recent years but I don't know what year it was. He resides in another town from where this road is, Only about a mile away, I have no interest in the result of this Contest.

Cross-examined

I had the conversation with Fleming shortly after the meeting, the first time I met the man. All I can tell you about the time is what I did tell you that it was shortly after the meeting. He was in a buggy. I can not recall least the time. If I owned Shryner farm I would value it pretty high. There is no good pasture land. I suppose the Shryner farm is worth \$40 or \$50 per acre without the mineral right. I cannot say what the mineral rights & mining privileges would be worth. I don't know that my valuation is too high. It has a brick house on it. I include the improvements with the surface. It would be less ^{than} eliminating the improvements than considering them. This is a Rent-to-Look. The road marked ~~as~~ created is cut out.

John Pickett,

Adam Eoch (affirmed)

I live in White Lake, straight across through the wood about $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles ^{from the road}. I am acquainted with both the supplied & vacated parts of this road I have been on both. Part of the supplied part ~~is along~~ is on dry ground. Most

of it is dry. The ground on the washed part
is bottom ground all the way through.
mostly low.

Ques - State what would be the compensation
damages to the farm of Mrs. Dragoon by the
two roads as marked on draft of Review.

Mr. Evans objects for the reason that it is ir-
relevant and immaterial.

Ans - On the line - on supplied part - I would
consider it no damages and of the property
was mine I would not have it run along
on the washed part for £500-. It would
be necessary to mill & the railroad taken by
the supplied part. I am not able to say
what the compensation costs of opening the two
roads would be. As the one is cut out
and the other aint.

Ques - State whether the part marked "washed
part" was ever opened by a Supervisor
or any ^{part} money spent on it.

Mr. Evans object as being irrelevant and
immaterial.

Ans - As to my knowledge, this wouldnt
I have lived in the neighborhood for 41 yrs.
I am not certain whether Mr. Fleming was
Supervisor on the 21 Feb 1890 or not. He was
a short time ago but I dont know just
when. I was one of the viewers in locat-
ing the road on the supplied part. Mr.
C. Fleming & Jas. H. Gallagher was at the
view. I did not hear Gallagher say

any thing but Fleming was opposed
to it

Cross-examined.

I was not in favor of vacating the old road any more than it did the stage farm an injury and would accommodate the public just as well on the line, I don't remember as I had any particular conversation with Daniel Shayes about it. He might have talked about it but I can't remember what was said, I was in favor of having the whole road vacated, because I did not think it was necessary, I live on the ridge and not on the road but down on the hollow. I might have admitted to Daniel Shayes that I thought this road ought to be vacated before I was appointed a receiver. I won't say that I did not, This is a road from James Gallagher's damon through Shayes property, I recollect that Mr. Baker lives a neighbor to James Gallagher. I could not say what Mr. Shayes farm is worth per acre, I haven't made up my mind - as far as the damages to Shayes is concerned. It's not the value of the ground but the cutting up the place, the fences and other inconveniences. The old road is more convenient so far as the church & school is concerned. The road I speak of from Gallagher's damon part Shayes is the road we vacated, I was

one of the viewers when the road was laid out originally from Chestnut back down to Strayer's. It was between 31 & 40 yrs ago. Adam C. Sch

John L. Gill (sworn)

My wife owns the property marked "Haltis" on Draft of Re-measured along the Strayer line. Ques - States whether or not ground was left for a road by Gen. Haltis stretching on the Park road and running back past McKees.

Mr. Eason objects as being irrelevant & immaterial, that in fact that a road may ought have been dedicated to public use at another point cannot affect this case however.

Ans; So far as McKees line runs, it was left. After since Gen. Haltis death, McKee bought another lot from us and we reserved a road way through it. We - my wife & myself are willing that the road shall be laid out or supplied on the line without claim of damages. The majority of the ground of supplies had no good ground for a road.

Cross-examined.

I don't know whether my wife owns the land out to where the supplies had intersected the old road or not. There was no written lease given by my wife and myself for the ground over which the supplies

was wrong to do it. I don't think so yet.
It was never recognized as a public road
by the citizens. I can not say that I knew
it had been ordered to be opened by the Court.
I never heard that it was a public road.
I did hear that the Court refused to accept
it. I did not hear before that that it had
been laid out as a public road. I do not

know whether I circulated the petition to have the road washed or not, I can't say who circulated it, I don't know whether that petition set forth that it was a public road or not. I could only guess at that but I presume so. For 75⁰ I wanted grade the road where ever it needs it. This is not much grade, about it only a one place. I mean to put it in shape that they can wagon on it. The grade on the new road would not be the same as that on the old road. I would say that
